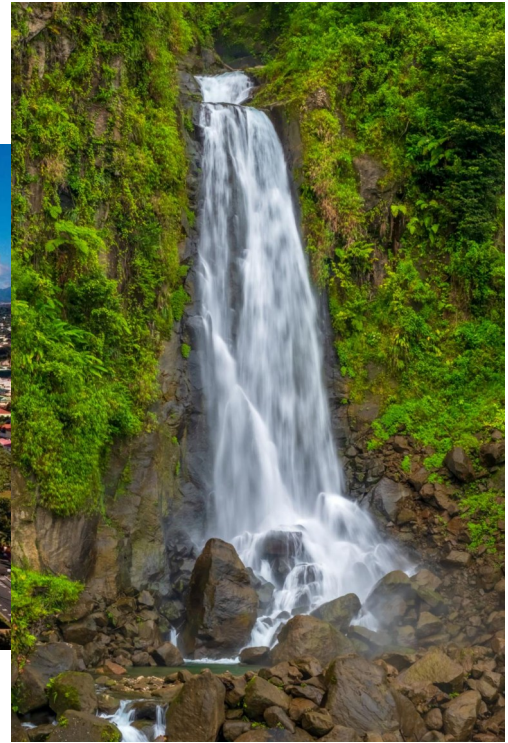


Dominica Cruise Port Guide

Known as the "**Nature Island of the Caribbean,**" Dominica (pronounced *Dom-in-EE-ka*) is unlike any other Caribbean island. Instead of sprawling resorts and crowded beaches, you'll find towering mountains, lush rainforests, volcanic landscapes, rushing rivers, hot springs, waterfalls, and some of the best hiking and eco-adventures anywhere in the Caribbean.

For travelers who love nature, photography, hiking, snorkeling, or simply exploring beyond the ordinary, Dominica is often considered one of the Caribbean's hidden treasures.

Where Do Cruise Ships Dock?

💧 Trafalgar Falls



One of Dominica's most famous attractions.

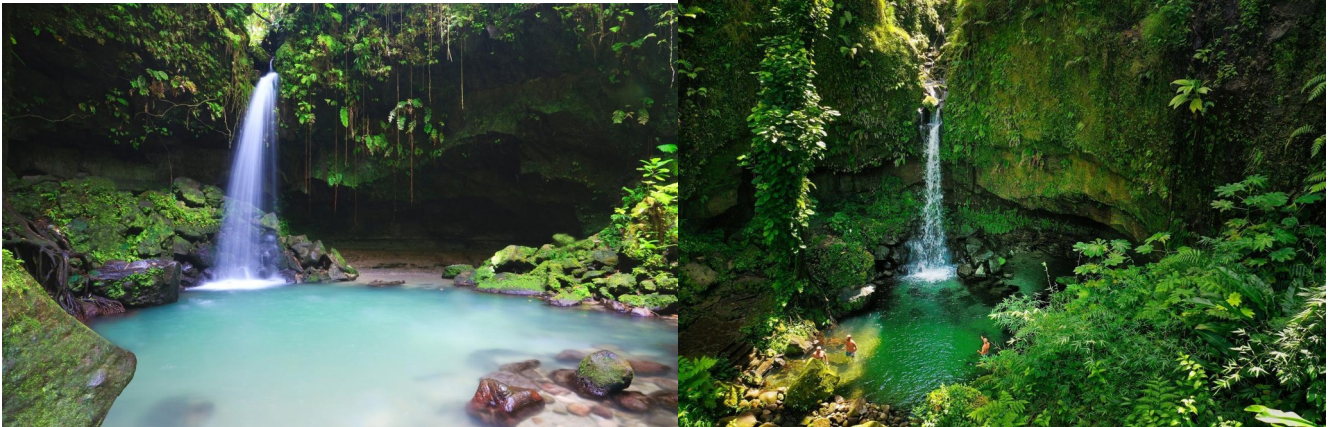
Known as the "**Twin Falls**," these spectacular waterfalls are surrounded by lush rainforest and volcanic scenery.

Visitors can:

- Walk scenic trails
- Photograph the falls
- Soak in nearby hot mineral pools
- Enjoy breathtaking mountain views

This excursion is suitable for most fitness levels.

Emerald Pool



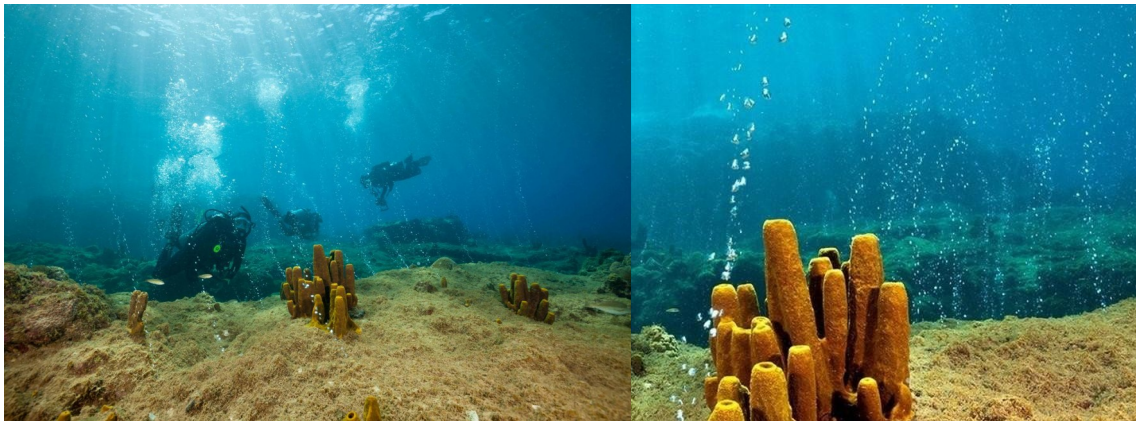
One of the Caribbean's most beautiful natural swimming holes.

Features include:

- Rainforest trail
- Waterfall
- Natural pool
- Tropical vegetation

A short, easy walk makes this a favorite excursion for families.

Champagne Reef



One of the world's most unique snorkeling locations.

Volcanic gases create streams of bubbles rising from the ocean floor, making it feel as if you're snorkeling in champagne.

Expect:

- Sea turtles
- Tropical fish
- Coral reefs

- Warm underwater springs

This is one of Dominica's signature experiences.

Titou Gorge



Swim through a narrow volcanic canyon to reach a hidden waterfall deep within the rainforest.

Movie fans may recognize the gorge from scenes in *Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest*.

This is one of the island's most memorable adventures.

Indian River Boat Tour



Glide quietly through lush mangroves while learning about the island's history and wildlife.

The peaceful setting has also appeared in several Hollywood films.



Boiling Lake Hike

For experienced hikers only.

One of the world's largest boiling lakes sits inside an active volcanic region.

The full hike is challenging and usually too long for cruise visitors, but it's worth mentioning for travelers staying on the island.



Best Beaches

Dominica isn't known primarily for beaches, but it has several beautiful coastal areas.



Mero Beach



A beautiful black-sand beach featuring:

- Calm swimming
 - Local restaurants
 - Beach bars

Purple Turtle Beach

Located near Portsmouth.

Excellent snorkeling directly from shore.

Morne Trois Pitons National Park



A UNESCO World Heritage Site featuring:

- Rainforest
- Waterfalls
- Volcanoes
- Hot springs
- Rivers
- Hiking trails

One of the Caribbean's greatest natural treasures.

Freshwater Lake

A peaceful mountain lake surrounded by rainforest.

Popular with hikers and birdwatchers.



Shopping

Dominica is less commercialized than many Caribbean islands.

Popular purchases include:

- Handmade crafts
- Local soaps

- Essential oils
- Spices
- Coffee
- Cocoa
- Herbal teas
- Local rum

The Roseau Craft Market offers the best selection.

What to Eat

Don't leave Dominica without trying:

- Mountain chicken (a local nickname for a traditional frog dish, though now rarely available due to conservation efforts)
- Callaloo soup
- Fresh seafood
- Creole fish
- Plantains
- Breadfruit
- Cocoa tea
- Passion fruit juice
- Sorrel drink

If you've visited Dominica before, consider exploring:

- Middleham Falls
- Syndicate Nature Trail
- Cabrits National Park
- Scott's Head
- Soufrière Hot Springs
- Wotten Waven Hot Springs

These destinations showcase the island's incredible natural beauty away from the busiest excursion routes.

Weather Throughout the Year

Dominica enjoys warm tropical weather year-round.

Winter (December – February)

- Highs: **80–83°F (27–28°C)**
- Comfortable humidity
- Excellent hiking weather

Spring (March – May)

- Highs: **81–85°F (27–29°C)**
- Warm and pleasant

Summer (June – August)

- Highs: **85–89°F (29–32°C)**
- Warm and humid
- Frequent brief showers keep the island lush

Fall (September – November)

- Highs: **82–87°F (28–31°C)**
- Warm temperatures
- More frequent rainfall

The rainforest climate means short showers are common throughout the year, but they often pass quickly.

Hurricane Season

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from:

June 1 – November 30

Peak activity usually occurs during:

- August
- September
- October

Dominica has experienced significant hurricanes in the past, but its people are known for their resilience and warm hospitality.

Travel insurance is always recommended.



Getting Around

Transportation options include:

- Taxi
- Cruise excursions
- Guided eco-tours
- Rental cars (driving is on the **left** side of the road)

Because of the island's mountainous terrain, many attractions are **30–60 minutes** from the cruise port.



What to Pack

Bring:

- ✓ Comfortable hiking shoes
 - ✓ Swimsuit
 - ✓ Reef-safe sunscreen
 - ✓ Sunglasses
 - ✓ Hat
 - ✓ Lightweight rain jacket
 - ✓ Insect repellent
 - ✓ Waterproof phone pouch
 - ✓ Dry bag for electronics
 - ✓ Reusable water bottle
