Where Do Cruise Ships Dock?



San Juan has two primary cruise terminals.

Old San Juan Piers

Many cruise ships dock directly in historic Old San Juan.

If your ship docks here, you'll step off the ship directly into one of the Caribbean's most beautiful historic districts.

You'll find:

- Restaurants

- Historic landmarks
- Museums

- Excursion meeting points
- Taxis

All within easy walking distance.

Pan American Pier

Some larger ships and homeport cruises use the Pan American Pier.

This terminal is only a short taxi or rideshare ride from Old San Juan.

Visit Castillo San Felipe del Morro



One of the most famous forts in the Western Hemisphere.

Built by Spain beginning in the 1500s, El Morro protected San Juan Harbor for centuries.

Visitors enjoy:

- Massive stone walls
- Historic tunnels
- Ocean views
- Cannons
- Museums
- Beautiful walking trails

It's a must-see for first-time visitors.



Explore Castillo San Cristóbal

Often overlooked in favor of El Morro, San Cristóbal is actually the larger of the two forts.

Features include:

- Underground tunnels
- Guard posts
- Historic exhibits
- Incredible city views

Admission to one fort typically includes access to both on the same day.

The only tropical rainforest in the U.S. National Forest System.

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Hidden Gems

If you've visited San Juan before, consider:

- Paseo del Morro
- Paseo de la Princesa
- Casa Blanca Museum
- Santa María Magdalena Cemetery
- La Fortaleza (Governor's Mansion)
- Calle de la Fortaleza (especially when decorated seasonally)

These locations offer incredible photo opportunities while avoiding some of the larger crowds.

Weather Throughout the Year

San Juan enjoys warm tropical weather all year.

Winter (December – February)

- Highs: **82–84°F (28–29°C)**
- Comfortable humidity
- Excellent sightseeing weather

Spring (March – May)

- Highs: **84–87°F (29–31°C)**
- Sunny and warm

Summer (June – August)

- Highs: **88–91°F (31–33°C)**
- Hot and humid
- Afternoon showers possible

Fall (September – November)

- Highs: **85–89°F (29–32°C)**
- Warm temperatures
- Fewer crowds during parts of the season

Ocean temperatures remain ideal for swimming year-round.

Hurricane Season

Hurricane season officially runs from:

June 1 – November 30

Peak activity typically occurs:

- August
- September
- October

Cruise lines monitor tropical weather carefully and adjust itineraries when necessary.

Travel insurance is always recommended.

Transportation

Getting around San Juan is easy.

Options include:

- Walking (Old San Juan)
- Taxi
- Uber
- Shore excursions
- Public buses

Most first-time visitors can spend an entire day exploring Old San Juan without needing transportation.
