Where Do Cruise Ships Dock?



Cruise ships dock in **Kingstown**, the capital of St. Vincent.

One of St. Vincent's most popular natural attractions.

La Soufrière Volcano



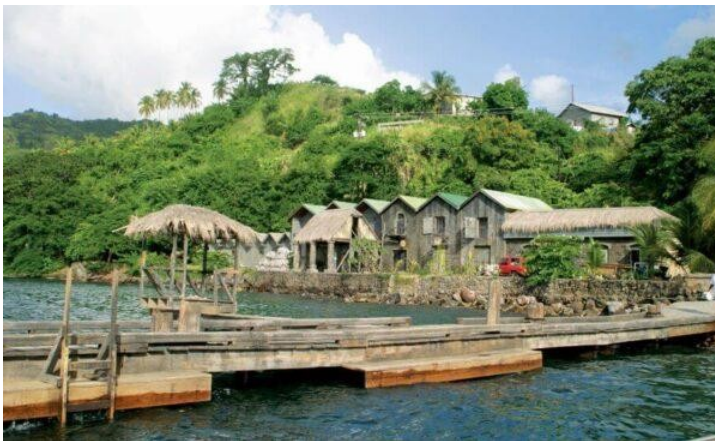
Towering more than 4,000 feet above the island, **La Soufrière** is an active volcano and one of St. Vincent's defining landmarks.

The full hike generally requires a full day and is better suited for land-based visitors than most cruise passengers, but scenic tours of the surrounding area are available.

Weather Throughout the Year

St. Vincent enjoys a tropical climate with warm temperatures year-round.

Winter (December – February)

- Highs: **80–83°F (27–28°C)**
- Comfortable humidity
- Excellent sightseeing weather

Spring (March – May)

- Highs: **81–85°F (27–29°C)**
- Warm and sunny

Summer (June – August)

- Highs: **86–90°F (30–32°C)**
- Warm and humid
- Brief tropical showers

Fall (September – November)

- Highs: **83–88°F (28–31°C)**
- Warm temperatures
- Lush green landscapes

Trade winds help keep the island comfortable throughout the year.

Hurricane Season

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from:

June 1 – November 30

Peak activity generally occurs during:

- August
- September
- October

Cruise lines monitor weather closely and adjust itineraries when necessary.

Travel insurance is always recommended.

Getting Around

Transportation options include:

- Taxi
- Cruise excursions
- Rental cars (driving is on the **left** side of the road)
- Local minibuses

Many attractions are located **30–60 minutes** from the cruise terminal due to the island's mountainous terrain.
