They were known for:

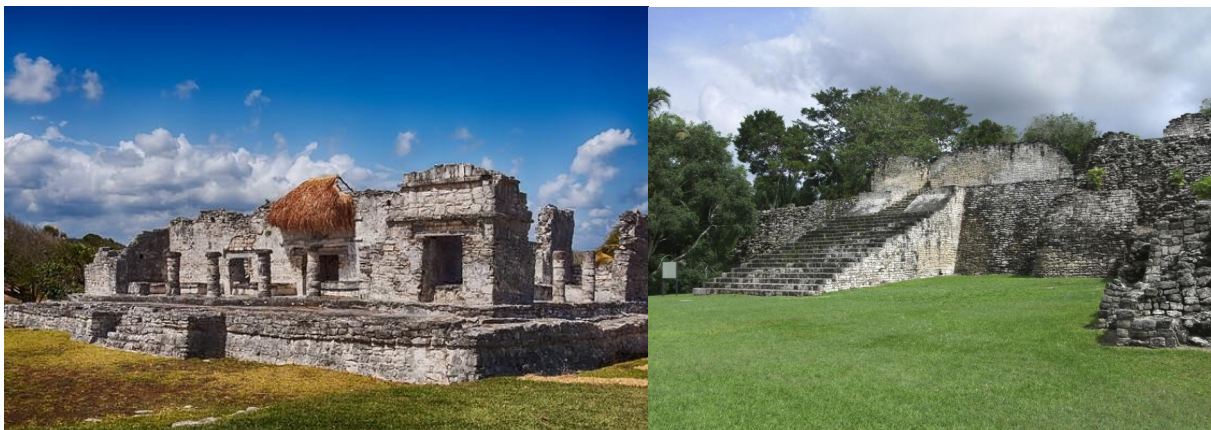
- Sophisticated cities

The Maya carefully studied the skies.

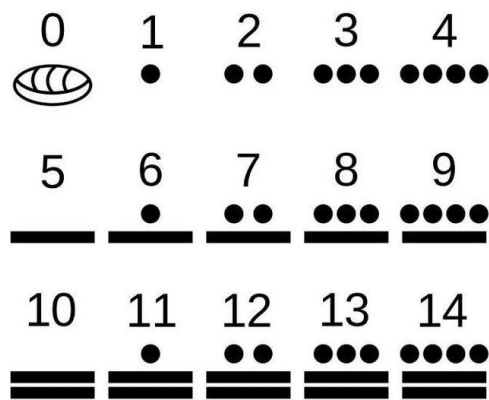
They developed:

Remarkable Achievements



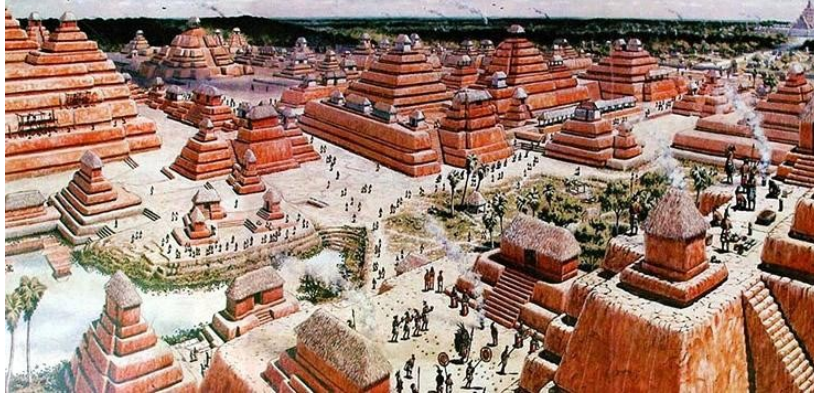
The Maya were centuries ahead of their time in many fields.
