Where Do Cruise Ships Dock?



Cruise ships dock directly in **Kralendijk**, the island's colorful capital.

Depending on ship size, your vessel may:

- Dock alongside the pier
- Anchor offshore with tender service

Both options place you within easy walking distance of downtown.

🏝️ Bonaire National Marine Park



Bonaire is consistently ranked among the **best diving and snorkeling destinations in the world**.

The protected marine park surrounds the entire island and features:

- Vibrant coral reefs
- Sea turtles
- Parrotfish
- Angelfish
- Eagle rays
- Exceptional water clarity

Many snorkeling sites are accessible directly from shore.

🦩 Bonaire Flamingo Sanctuary & Salt Flats



One of Bonaire's most iconic sights.

Te Amo Beach



Located close to the cruise port.

Sorobon Beach



Located on Lac Bay.

Bachelor's Beach

A small beach popular for:

- Shore diving

 - Calm water
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Pink Beach

Although smaller than it once was, Pink Beach remains one of Bonaire's most scenic coastal stops.

Shore Diving Capital of the Caribbean

One thing that makes Bonaire truly unique is its **shore diving**.

Unlike many islands where divers must take a boat, Bonaire features more than **80 marked dive sites** that can be reached directly from shore.

Even non-divers will appreciate the incredible visibility while snorkeling.

Weather Throughout the Year

Bonaire enjoys one of the Caribbean's most reliable climates.

Winter (December – February)

- Highs: **82–86°F (28–30°C)**
- Dry season
- Comfortable trade winds

Spring (March – May)

- Highs: **84–88°F (29–31°C)**
- Sunny and warm

Summer (June – August)

- Highs: **87–91°F (31–33°C)**
- Warm with cooling breezes

Fall (September – November)

- Highs: **86–90°F (30–32°C)**
- Warm temperatures
- Minimal rainfall

Bonaire enjoys sunshine almost every day of the year.

Hurricane Season

The Atlantic hurricane season officially runs from:

June 1 – November 30

Like Aruba and Curaçao, Bonaire lies **well south of the traditional hurricane belt**, making direct hurricane impacts very uncommon.

This makes Bonaire one of the Caribbean's most reliable cruise destinations throughout the year.

Getting Around

Transportation options include:

- Licensed taxis
- Rental cars
- Golf carts
- Cruise excursions
- Bicycle rentals

Approximate travel times:

- Te Amo Beach – **5 minutes**
- Salt Flats – **20 minutes**
- Flamingo Sanctuary – **20 minutes**
- Washington Slagbaai National Park – **40 minutes**
- Sorobon Beach – **20 minutes**

Many visitors enjoy renting a golf cart or small vehicle to explore the island independently.

What to Pack

Bring:

- ✓ Swimsuit
- ✓ Reef-safe sunscreen

- ✓ Sunglasses
- ✓ Hat
- ✓ Water shoes
- ✓ Snorkeling gear (optional)
- ✓ Lightweight clothing
- ✓ Waterproof phone pouch
- ✓ Reusable water bottle

Because Bonaire is known for its reefs, avoid standing on or touching coral while snorkeling or diving.

Premium Travel Group Tip

If this is your first visit, don't feel pressured to fill every minute with activities. Bonaire is an island best enjoyed at a slower pace.

Take time to snorkel in the crystal-clear water, visit the flamingos and salt flats, and enjoy lunch overlooking the harbor in Kralendijk.

If you're considering this option, reserve your golf cart well before your cruise. Rentals are extremely popular with cruise visitors, and they often sell out weeks—or even months—in advance, especially during the busy cruise season.

Exploring Bonaire at your own pace lets you experience parts of the island that many organized excursions never reach. It's one of the most enjoyable and memorable ways I've found to spend a day here, and it's an experience I highly recommend.
