Boston's primary cruise terminal is:

Flynn Cruiseport Boston

Located in the South Boston waterfront district.

The terminal serves many cruise lines sailing to:

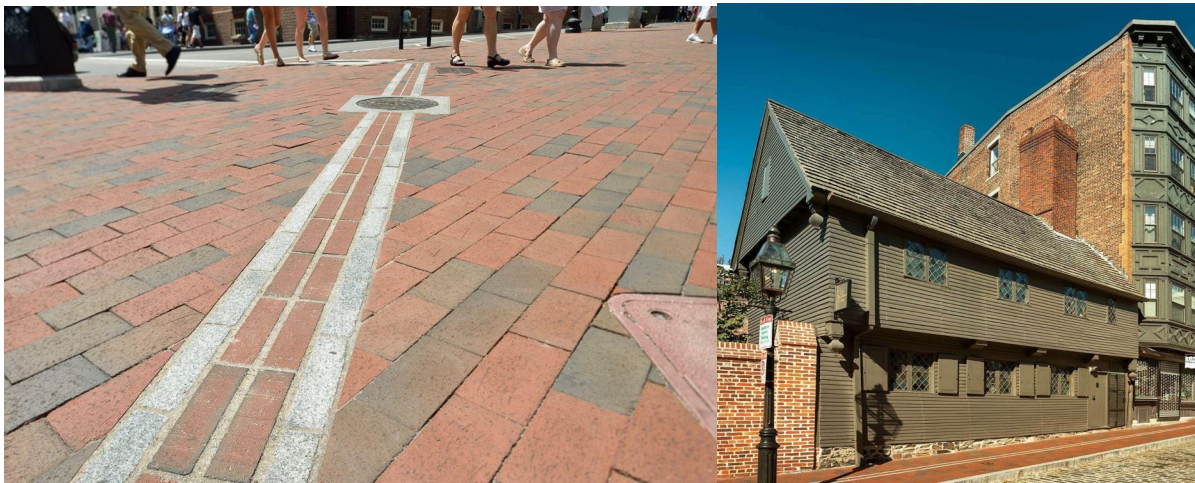
- New England & Canada

Walk the Freedom Trail



Boston's most famous attraction is the **Freedom Trail**.

This 2.5-mile walking route connects 16 historic sites, including:

- Boston Common
- Massachusetts State House
- Park Street Church
- Granary Burying Ground
- King's Chapel
- Old South Meeting House
- Old State House
- Faneuil Hall
- Paul Revere House
- Old North Church
- Bunker Hill Monument
