Explore the Living Foundation of the Caribbean Sea



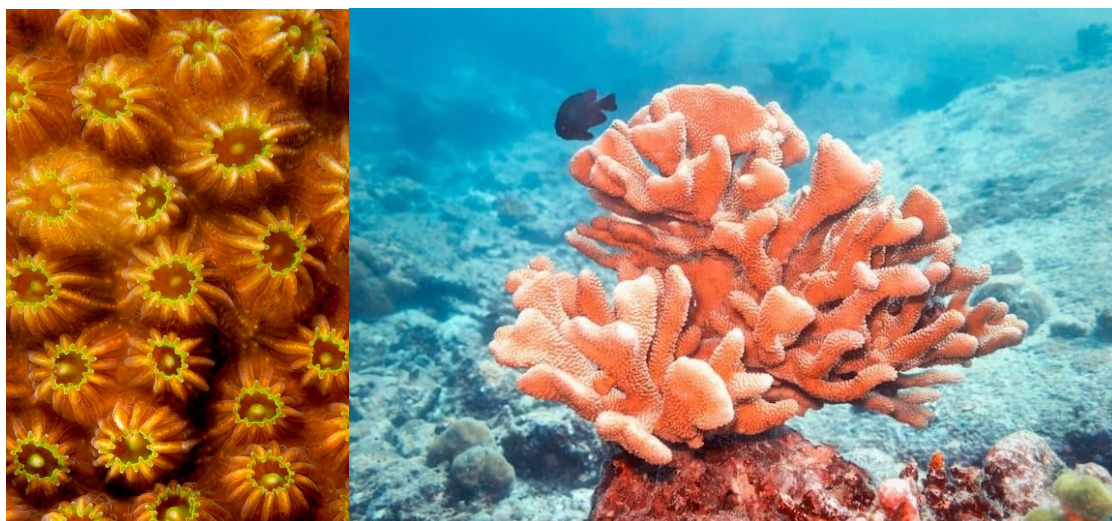

What Is Coral?



One of the biggest surprises for many visitors is that coral isn't a plant or a rock.

Coral is made up of thousands of tiny animals called **polyps**.

Each polyp:

- Builds a limestone skeleton
- Lives alongside microscopic algae
- Works together with neighboring polyps
- Helps create massive reef structures over time

Some coral reefs have been growing for **thousands of years**.



Common Caribbean Coral Species



The Caribbean is home to many spectacular coral species.

Some of the most recognizable include:



Elkhorn Coral

Named for its large, branching shape that resembles elk antlers.



Brain Coral

Recognized by its maze-like surface, similar to the human brain.



Sea Fans

Soft corals that gently sway with ocean currents.



Staghorn Coral

Another branching coral that provides important shelter for reef fish.

Each species plays an important role in creating habitat for marine life.

- Coral bleaching
- Pollution

Fortunately, many Caribbean islands now have active reef restoration and conservation programs.

- Use reef-safe sunscreen.
- Never touch or stand on coral.
- Avoid collecting shells or coral.
- Keep a respectful distance from marine life.
- Choose eco-friendly tour operators.

- Coral reefs cover **less than 1% of the ocean floor**, yet they support an estimated **25% of all marine species**.
 - Some coral colonies in the Caribbean are **hundreds of years old**, while reef systems themselves may have developed over **thousands of years**.
 - Coral polyps live in partnership with tiny algae called **zooxanthellae**, which provide much of the coral's food and its vibrant colors.
 - The **Belize Barrier Reef** is part of the **Mesoamerican Reef**, the second-largest barrier reef system in the world.
 - Scientists around the Caribbean are growing coral in underwater nurseries before transplanting it back onto damaged reefs to help restore these vital ecosystems.

One of the biggest surprises I like sharing with travelers is this:

You're not looking at rocks.

You're looking at living animals.

The first time I learned that coral is actually made up of thousands of tiny living polyps, it completely changed the way I looked at every snorkeling trip. Suddenly, I wasn't just swimming over a colorful reef—I was floating above an ecosystem that had been slowly growing for centuries.

It's also a reminder that these beautiful places are more fragile than they appear. A careless step or a touch of a hand can damage coral that has taken decades to grow.

That's why I always encourage people to slow down, float, and simply observe. Not only does it protect the reef, but it's also the best way to discover all the incredible life hiding among the coral.

Every sea turtle, angelfish, parrotfish, and nurse shark depends on these reefs in some way. Protecting coral means protecting the entire Caribbean experience for generations of travelers to come.

Sometimes the smallest creatures create the greatest wonders—and coral reefs are living proof.
