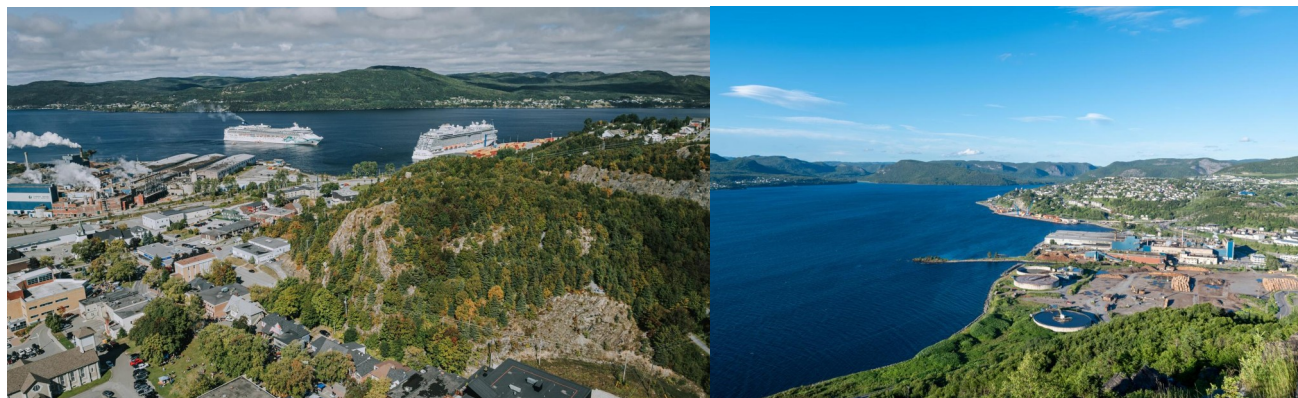


Corner Brook, Newfoundland Cruise Port Guide

Bay of Islands



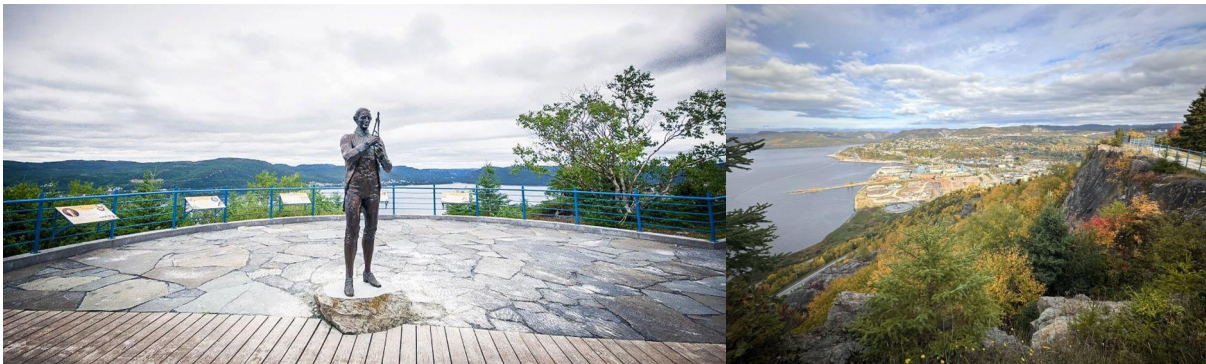
Corner Brook sits along the beautiful **Bay of Islands**.

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Fun Facts

- Corner Brook is located on the **Bay of Islands**, one of Newfoundland's most scenic natural harbors.
 - **Gros Morne National Park** became a **UNESCO World Heritage Site** because of its unique geology and outstanding natural beauty.
 - Newfoundland has an estimated **120,000–150,000 moose**, despite the species not being native to the island—they were introduced in the early 1900s and thrived.
 - Captain James Cook created some of the most accurate maps of Newfoundland's coastline before becoming one of history's greatest explorers.
 - Western Brook Pond in Gros Morne is technically a **landlocked freshwater fjord**, carved by glaciers thousands of years ago.
