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## What Is a CruiseTour?



A CruiseTour combines your cruise with a land vacation.

Depending on the itinerary, you may spend extra time in destinations such as:

- Québec City
- Montréal
- Boston
- Acadia National Park
- Cape Breton
- Bay of Fundy

These tours often include:

- Hotel accommodations

- Guided sightseeing
- Motorcoach transportation
- Additional meals (varies by package)
- More time to explore



## What You Can Experience on a CruiseTour



Extra land time allows you to enjoy experiences that are difficult to fit into a single port day.

Popular attractions include:

- Walking the historic streets of Old Québec
- Exploring Montréal's neighborhoods and museums
- Driving the Cabot Trail

- Sampling regional cuisine at local restaurants

## Cruise

## CruiseTour

Typically:

- 10–16+ days
- Cruise plus land vacation
- More time in selected destinations

A CruiseTour is perfect if you're not in a hurry and want to explore more deeply.

Usually:

- Moderate walking
- Flexible pace
- Easy to return to the ship

## CruiseTour

May include:

- Longer sightseeing days
- More hotel check-ins

- Motorcoach travel
- Additional walking

Best for:

- Coastal scenery
- Lighthouses
- Harbor towns
- Sail-away views

### CruiseTour

Adds:

- Sunrise photography
- Sunset landscapes
- National parks
- Scenic mountain drives
- Historic cities after the crowds have left
