

Curaçao Floating Market Guide

Experience One of the Caribbean's Most Colorful Waterfront Traditions



One of the most unique cultural attractions in the Southern Caribbean is the **Floating Market** in **Willemstad, Curaçao**. Located along the city's historic waterfront, this colorful market has long been a place where Venezuelan merchants arrived by boat to sell fresh fruits, vegetables, seafood, and local products directly from their vessels.

Although the market has evolved over the years due to changing regional trade and border conditions, it remains one of Curaçao's most recognizable landmarks and a symbol of the island's long-standing connection with neighboring South America.

Just a short walk from the cruise terminal, the Floating Market offers visitors a wonderful opportunity to experience local culture, sample Caribbean flavors, and explore one of Willemstad's most photographed waterfront districts.

What Is the Floating Market?



Unlike a traditional farmers market, the Floating Market earned its name because many vendors historically sold their goods directly from **wooden boats** moored along the waterfront.

Products commonly found include:

- Fresh tropical fruit
- Vegetables
- Herbs
- Local spices
- Fresh seafood
- Handmade goods

Today, the market continues to celebrate Curaçao's maritime heritage while offering visitors a taste of local life.



Fresh Caribbean Flavors



The market is a wonderful place to discover Caribbean produce.

Depending on the season, you may find:

- Mangoes
- Papayas
- Pineapples
- Bananas
- Passion fruit
- Avocados
- Limes
- Fresh coconuts

Many vendors are happy to explain unfamiliar fruits and offer preparation suggestions.



Fresh Seafood



Seafood has always played an important role in the Floating Market.

Visitors may see:

- Fresh fish
- Shrimp
- Lobster (seasonal)
- Local catches of the day

Nearby restaurants often feature these fresh ingredients in traditional Curaçaoan dishes.

- Brightly painted Dutch colonial buildings
- Traditional market boats

- Photograph tropical fruit displays for vibrant colors.
- Cross the Queen Emma Bridge for panoramic views of the market and harbor.

- The Floating Market has traditionally been supplied by **small Venezuelan boats** bringing fresh produce and seafood to Curaçao.
 - It is located in **Punda**, the oldest district of Willemstad and part of a **UNESCO World Heritage Site**.
 - The nearby **Queen Emma Bridge**, often called the "Swinging Old Lady," is one of the few floating pontoon bridges still operating in the world.
 - The colorful **Handelskade** waterfront behind the market is one of the most photographed locations in the Caribbean.
 - While the market has changed over time due to regional trade and political conditions, it remains an important symbol of Curaçao's maritime and cultural heritage.
