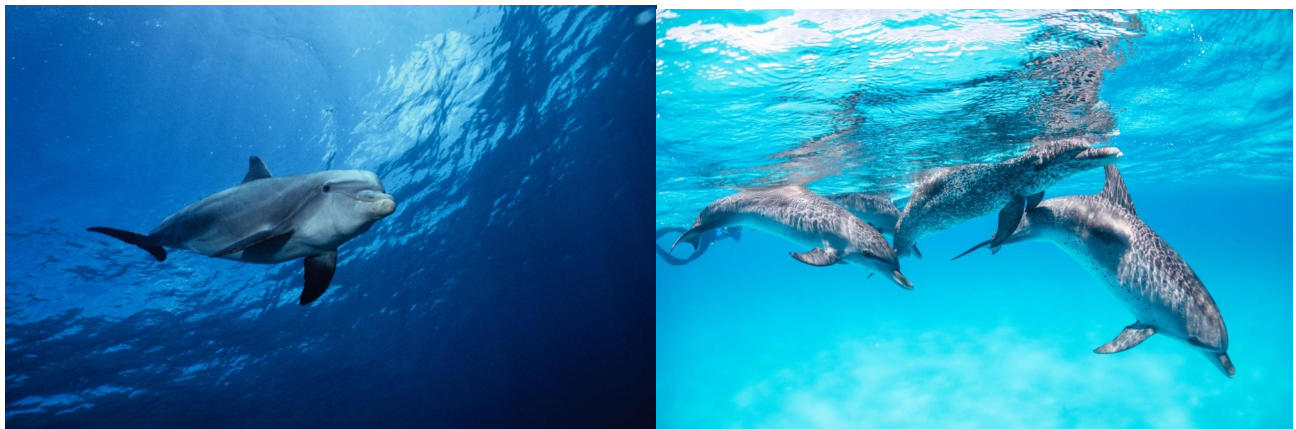

Common Bottlenose Dolphin

The species most frequently seen by visitors.

Known for:

- Friendly appearance
- Curious behavior
- Acrobatic leaps
- Highly social groups

Atlantic Spotted Dolphin

Recognized by the white spots that develop as they mature.

Often seen around:

- The Bahamas
- Belize
- Offshore reefs

Spinner Dolphin

Famous for its spectacular spinning jumps above the water.

Usually found in deeper offshore waters.

What Do Dolphins Eat?



Caribbean dolphins primarily feed on:

- Small fish
- Squid
- Shrimp
- Schooling baitfish

They often work together, using teamwork to herd fish into tight groups before feeding.



Watching Dolphins Responsibly



The best dolphin encounters happen naturally.

When observing dolphins:

- Keep a respectful distance.
- Avoid chasing them with boats.
- Let the dolphins choose whether to approach.
- Never attempt to feed wild dolphins.
- Follow your captain's guidance.

Many dolphins are naturally curious and may approach boats on their own.

As top predators, dolphins help maintain healthy marine ecosystems.

Their presence often indicates:

- Healthy fish populations
- Clean coastal waters
- Thriving marine habitats

Dolphins sometimes ride the ship's bow wave, creating a magical experience that many passengers never notice.

Fun Facts

- Dolphins **breathe air**, just like humans, and must regularly surface through the blowhole on top of their heads.
- A group of dolphins is called a **pod**, which may include just a few individuals or dozens of animals.
- Bottlenose dolphins can swim at speeds of **over 20 miles (32 km) per hour**.
- Dolphins use **echolocation**, sending out sound waves that bounce off objects to help them navigate and locate prey.
- Mother dolphins nurse and care for their calves for several years, teaching them essential survival skills.
