Most sled dogs in Alaska are **Alaskan Huskies**, not Siberian Huskies.

They're bred for:

- Endurance
- Intelligence

- Speed
- Teamwork
- Friendly personalities

These dogs genuinely love to run and often bark excitedly when it's time to head out on the trail.

The Iditarod



Dog sledding is closely associated with the famous **Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race**.

The race covers approximately:

- **1,000 miles**
- Anchorage ceremonial start
- Official restart near Willow
- Finish in Nome

It celebrates Alaska's historic mail and supply routes while honoring the courage and teamwork of mushers and their dogs.

- Anchorage (pre- or post-cruise)
