✈️ What is Flightseeing?



Flightseeing is a scenic aerial tour designed to showcase Alaska's incredible landscapes.

Depending on the excursion, you may fly over:

- Massive glaciers
- Icefields
- Fjords

- Mountain ranges
- Waterfalls
- Rivers
- Wildlife habitats
- National Parks

Many flights include narration from experienced local pilots who share fascinating stories about Alaska's geography, history, and wildlife.

Kenai Fjords

Mountain peaks, glaciers, and marine wildlife.

Fixed-Wing Aircraft

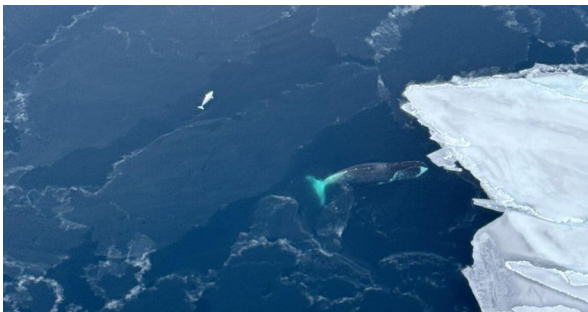
Often feature:

Wildlife From the Air



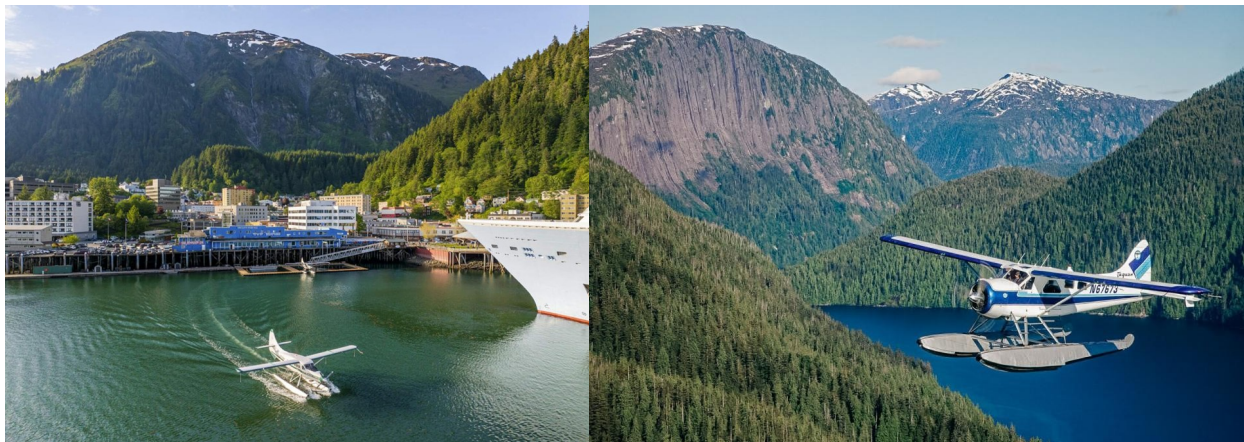
Although scenery is the main attraction, you may also spot:

- Harbor Seals
- Bald Eagles

Photography Tips



For the best photos:

- Wear dark clothing to reduce window reflections.
- Keep your camera close to the window without touching it.
- Use a fast shutter speed.
- Turn off the flash.
- Enjoy the scenery between photos.

Don't spend the entire flight looking through your camera.

Weather Matters



Flightseeing depends heavily on weather conditions.

Clouds, fog, or strong winds may delay or cancel flights.

The good news:

Safety always comes first, and reputable operators will never fly in unsafe conditions.

Flexibility is part of every Alaska adventure.



What Should You Bring?

Bring:

- ✓ Camera
- ✓ Sunglasses
- ✓ Light jacket
- ✓ Fully charged phone
- ✓ Motion sickness medication if you're sensitive to small aircraft

Most flights last between **30 minutes and 2 hours**, depending on the excursion.

Premium Travel Group Tip

If you've never flown in a small aircraft before, don't let that stop you. Alaska's flightseeing pilots are highly experienced professionals who fly these routes regularly. If you have a choice of seats, ask about window placement when booking—but remember that every passenger enjoys incredible views during the flight.

- More people travel by **small aircraft in Alaska** than in any other U.S. state because many communities aren't connected by roads.
 - Alaska has more **licensed pilots per capita** than anywhere else in the United States.
 - Some flightseeing tours include glacier landings where you can walk on ancient ice.
 - Floatplanes can take off from and land on both lakes and protected coastal waters.
 - On a clear day, you may be able to see **hundreds of miles** across Alaska's rugged wilderness.
