



Forts of San Juan Guide

Explore the Historic Guardians of Puerto Rico



For more than 400 years, the mighty forts of **San Juan, Puerto Rico** have stood watch over one of the Caribbean's most important harbors. Built by Spain to defend its New World empire, these impressive stone fortresses protected treasure fleets, repelled invading armies, and witnessed centuries of Caribbean history.

Today, **Castillo San Felipe del Morro** and **Castillo San Cristóbal** are among Puerto Rico's most visited attractions and are part of the **San Juan National Historic Site**, a **UNESCO World Heritage Site**. Walking through these massive forts is like stepping back into the Age of Exploration, where towering walls, cannon batteries, and sweeping ocean views tell the story of one of the Caribbean's greatest military strongholds.

Whether you're a history enthusiast, photographer, or first-time visitor, exploring the forts is one of the best experiences in San Juan.



Castillo San Felipe del Morro



Known simply as **El Morro**, Castillo San Felipe del Morro is Puerto Rico's most iconic landmark.

Construction began in **1539**, with the fortress expanding over the next 250 years into one of Spain's strongest defensive structures in the Americas.

Highlights include:

- Six levels of fortifications
- Historic cannon batteries
- The iconic lighthouse
- Massive stone walls
- Underground passageways
- Spectacular Atlantic Ocean views

Standing atop El Morro's walls, it's easy to imagine Spanish ships arriving from Europe while enemy fleets approached from the horizon.



Castillo San Cristóbal



Located just east of El Morro, **Castillo San Cristóbal** was built to protect San Juan from attacks by land.

Completed in **1783**, it became the **largest Spanish fort built in the Americas**, covering more than **27 acres (11 hectares)**.

Visitors can explore:

- Guardhouses
- Underground tunnels
- Observation posts
- Dungeons
- Cannon emplacements
- Expansive defensive walls

Its impressive design demonstrates the sophistication of Spanish military engineering.

The City Walls



Connecting the forts are the famous **city walls of Old San Juan**.

These impressive fortifications once surrounded the city, protecting it from pirates, privateers, and foreign armies.

Today, visitors can stroll along sections of the walls while enjoying panoramic views of:

- San Juan Bay
- The Atlantic Ocean
- Historic Old San Juan
- Colorful colonial buildings

Defending the Caribbean



Over the centuries, San Juan's forts defended Puerto Rico against attacks by:

- English forces
- Dutch fleets
- French privateers
- Pirates
- Rival European empires

Despite numerous sieges, the defenses helped Spain maintain control of Puerto Rico for nearly four centuries.



Exploring Old San Juan



Many visitors combine the forts with a walking tour of **Old San Juan**.

- Colorful colonial buildings
- Blue cobblestone streets
- Historic churches
- Local cafés
- Artisan shops
- Public plazas

Everything is within walking distance, making it easy to spend an entire day exploring the historic district.

One of the best things about visiting San Juan is how accessible the forts are.

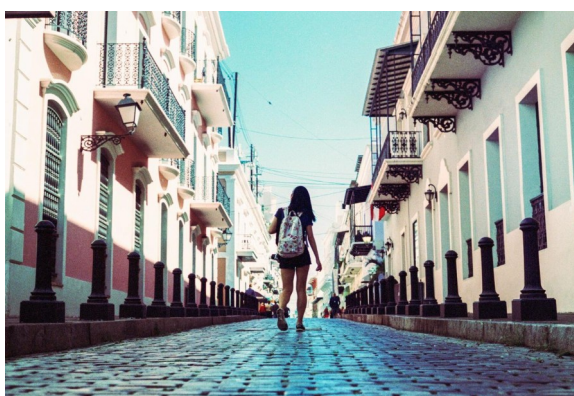
From the cruise port you can:

- **Castillo San Felipe del Morro** took nearly **250 years** to reach its final form as new defensive features were added over time.
- **Castillo San Cristóbal** is the **largest Spanish-built fortification in the Americas**.
- The blue-gray cobblestones throughout Old San Juan were originally used as **ballast** in Spanish ships crossing the Atlantic.
- The San Juan fortifications are recognized as a **UNESCO World Heritage Site**, celebrating their outstanding historical and architectural significance.
- During the **Spanish-American War of 1898**, El Morro fired some of its last defensive shots before Puerto Rico came under United States control.
