French Canadian Cuisine

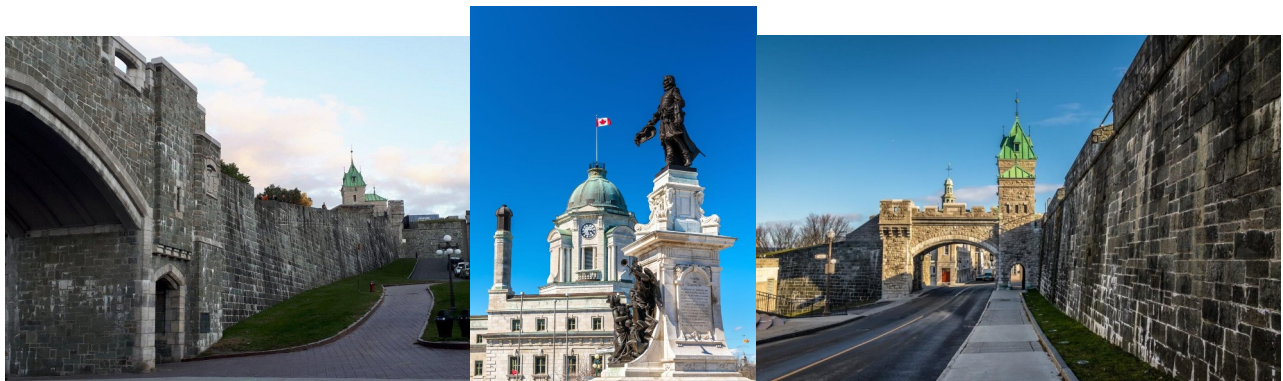


Be sure to try:

 - Québec City is the **only fortified city north of Mexico** with its original defensive walls still intact.
 - The iconic Château Frontenac is often called the **most photographed hotel in the world**.
 - Montréal is the **second-largest French-speaking city** in the world after Paris when measured by metropolitan population.
 - Maple syrup production is a major industry in Québec, which produces **about 70% of the world's maple syrup**.

The first time I visited Québec City, I remember thinking that it didn't feel like North America at all. Between the cobblestone streets, historic buildings, and people chatting in French at sidewalk cafés, it felt more like I had landed somewhere in Europe.

One thing I always tell travelers is not to worry about the language. Almost everyone you'll meet in the tourism industry speaks English, and the locals are friendly and welcoming. In fact, simply starting with a cheerful "**Bonjour**" is often enough to earn a smile before switching to English.
