Meet the Masters of the Caribbean Skies



Long before you spot dolphins or sea turtles, chances are you'll notice the birds soaring above the Caribbean Sea. Two of the region's most recognizable coastal birds are the **Magnificent Frigatebird** and the **Brown Pelican**. Whether gliding effortlessly over turquoise waters or diving dramatically for fish, these birds are an unforgettable part of the Caribbean experience.

From the beaches of **The Bahamas** and **Barbados** to the reefs of **Belize**, the harbors of **Curaçao**, and the coastlines of **Bonaire**, frigatebirds and pelicans are constant companions for cruise travelers exploring the islands.

Learning to recognize these remarkable birds adds another layer of appreciation to every day spent on the water.

♥ Magnificent Frigatebird



The **Magnificent Frigatebird** is one of the Caribbean's most impressive seabirds.

Recognized by:

- Long, narrow wings
- Deeply forked tail
- Graceful soaring flight
- Males with an inflatable bright red throat pouch during breeding season

With a wingspan reaching more than **7 feet (2.1 meters)**, they spend much of their lives soaring high above the ocean.



Masters of Flight



Frigatebirds are built for effortless flight.

They can:

- Glide for hours without flapping
- Ride warm air currents
- Travel long distances
- Catch food near the ocean's surface

Unlike many seabirds, their feathers are not waterproof, so they rarely land on the water.

♥ Brown Pelicans



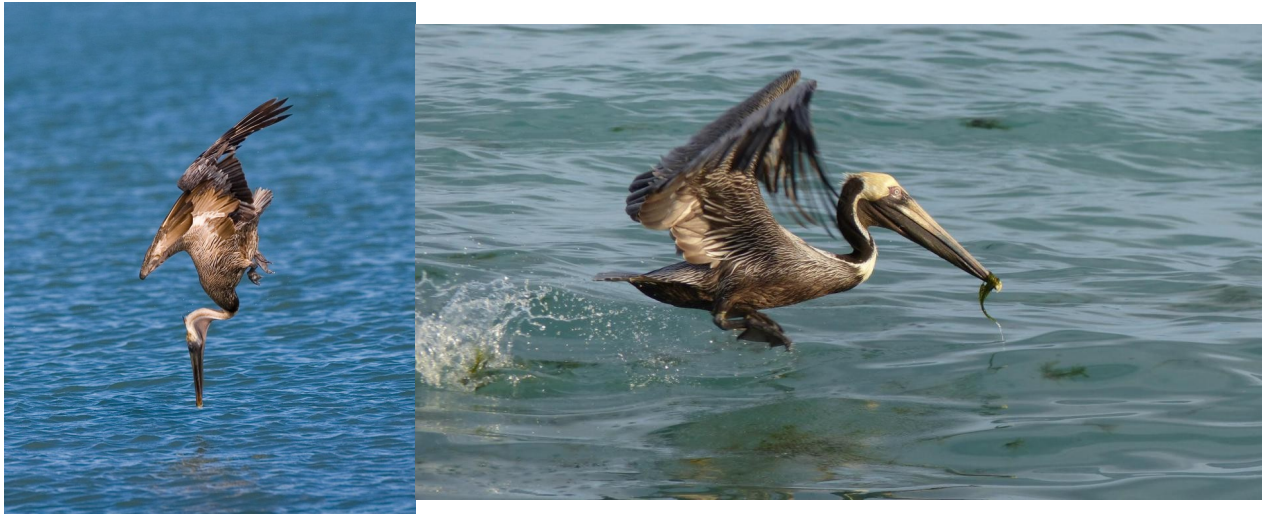
Brown Pelicans are among the easiest Caribbean birds to recognize.

Known for:

- Large throat pouch
- Long bill
- Heavy body
- Graceful gliding flight

They are commonly seen resting on docks, piers, mangroves, and navigation markers.

💧 The Famous Dive



Brown Pelicans hunt using one of nature's most spectacular techniques.

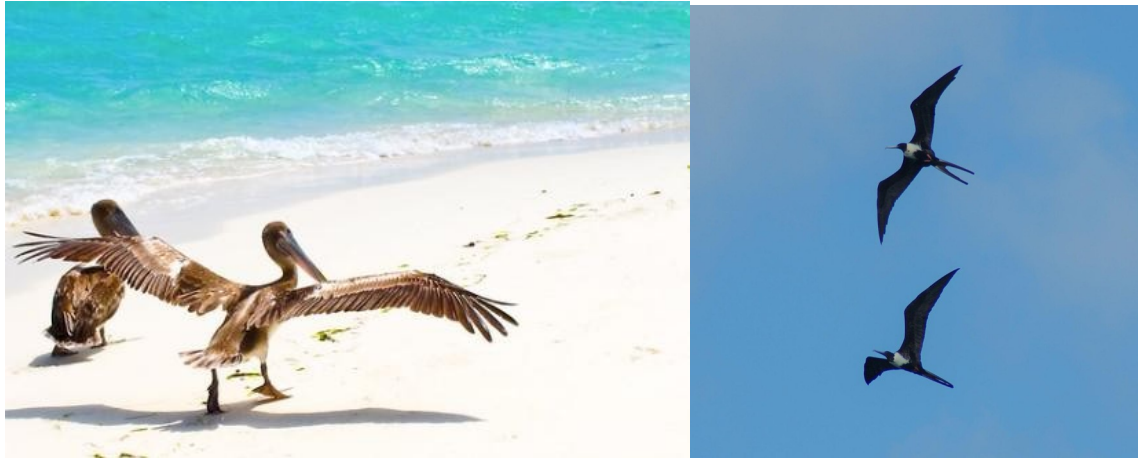
They:

- Fly above schools of fish.
- Spot prey from the air.
- Fold their wings.

- Dive headfirst into the water.
- Scoop up fish using their expandable throat pouch.

Watching a pelican perform a perfect plunge dive is a highlight of many Caribbean cruises.

These birds are important indicators of healthy marine ecosystems.

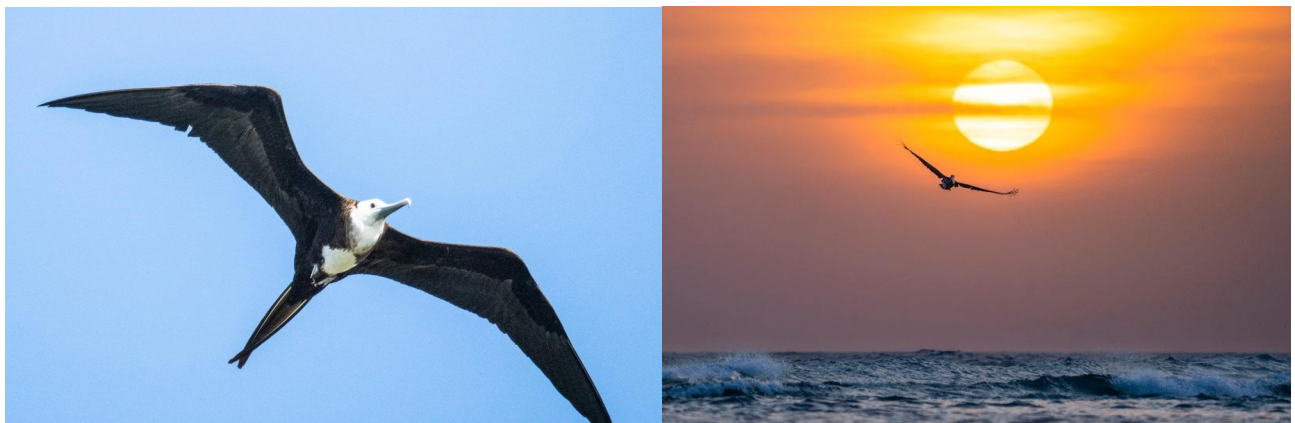
They help scientists monitor:

Photography Tips

- Use burst mode for pelican dives.
- Photograph frigatebirds soaring against blue skies.
- Visit harbors early in the morning.
- Look for pelicans perched on docks.

- Include the coastline for dramatic compositions.

Fun Facts

- **Magnificent Frigatebirds** have one of the **largest wingspan-to-body-weight ratios** of any bird, allowing them to soar for hours with very little effort.
 - Male frigatebirds inflate their brilliant **red throat pouch** like a balloon during courtship to attract females.
 - Brown Pelicans can plunge-dive from heights of **30–60 feet (9–18 meters)** to catch fish.
 - Pelicans have special air sacs beneath their skin that help cushion the impact of their dramatic dives.
 - Frigatebirds are sometimes nicknamed "**pirate birds**" because they occasionally chase other seabirds and steal their catch in a behavior known as **kleptoparasitism**.

These iconic seabirds are part of nearly every Caribbean coastal scene. Frigatebirds impress with their effortless soaring and incredible aerial skills, while pelicans entertain visitors with dramatic dives and

comical personalities. Together, they remind us that some of the Caribbean's best wildlife experiences happen not beneath the waves—but high above them.



Joe's Logbook

One thing I've learned after many cruises is that some of the best wildlife doesn't require an excursion ticket.

It just requires looking up.

As your ship sails into port, you'll often see frigatebirds effortlessly circling overhead without seeming to flap their wings. Then, almost without warning, a pelican folds its wings and dives straight into the water like a feathered missile. It never gets old.

I especially enjoy watching pelicans around fishing docks. They somehow manage to look both graceful and a little clumsy at the same time, and they always seem to know exactly where the next meal will appear.

The next time you're standing on your balcony or enjoying the open deck, take a few minutes to watch the sky as much as the sea. You may discover that some of the Caribbean's most entertaining wildlife spends its time soaring above the waves instead of swimming beneath them.

Sometimes the best birdwatching happens when you're simply waiting for the ship to dock.
