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## Fun Facts

- Halifax Harbour is one of the **largest natural harbors in the world**.
- The **Halifax Citadel** has overlooked the city since the 1800s and remains one of Canada's best-preserved military fortresses.
- Halifax played a significant role in the response to the **Titanic** disaster, with recovery ships based here and many victims buried in local cemeteries.
- The **Halifax Donair** was invented in the city and is considered Nova Scotia's official food.
- Peggy's Cove Lighthouse has guided sailors along Nova Scotia's rugged coast since **1915** and is one of Canada's most photographed landmarks.
