What Is Junkanoo?



Junkanoo is the national cultural festival of the Bahamas.

The celebration combines:

- Music
- Dance
- Handmade costumes
- Street parades
- Friendly competition
- Bahamian traditions

Each participating group creates elaborate themed costumes using materials such as:

- Cardboard
- Crepe paper
- Feathers
- Beads
- Fabric
- Sequins

Some costumes take thousands of hours to complete.

A Rich History



The origins of Junkanoo date back hundreds of years.

While historians continue to study its exact beginnings, many believe the tradition developed during the colonial era, when enslaved Africans were granted a few days of celebration during the Christmas season. Over time, those celebrations evolved into the vibrant cultural festival seen today.

Today, Junkanoo is recognized as one of the defining traditions of Bahamian identity.

The Sound of Junkanoo



You'll hear a unique blend of traditional instruments including:

- Goatskin drums
- Cowbells

- Brass instruments
- Whistles
- Horns

The powerful rhythms encourage both performers and spectators to dance along.

The music is energetic, joyful, and impossible to ignore.

Incredible Costumes



One of the festival's biggest attractions is the elaborate costumes.

Expect to see:

- Towering headdresses
- Bright tropical colors
- Detailed beadwork
- Massive feather displays
- Creative moving designs

Many costumes are handmade over several months by community groups competing for top honors.

Where to Experience Junkanoo



The largest celebrations take place in:

Nassau

- Bay Street
- Shirley Street

Other islands also host local celebrations throughout the year.

If your cruise doesn't coincide with the main festival, you can still learn about its history by visiting:

- Junkanoo museums
- Cultural centers
- Local art exhibits



When Does Junkanoo Take Place?



The two largest parades occur each year on:

- **Boxing Day (December 26)**
- **New Year's Day (January 1)**

Additional celebrations may be held during:

- Summer festivals
- Independence celebrations
- Special cultural events

Many cruise lines schedule holiday itineraries that allow guests to experience these famous parades.

Photography Tips



For the best photos:

- Arrive early for a good viewing spot.
 - Use burst mode for dancers.
 - Capture wide shots showing the entire parade.
 - Don't forget close-ups of costume details.
 - If photographing at night, adjust your camera for low-light conditions.

- Some Junkanoo groups spend **an entire year** designing and building their costumes for just a few hours of performance.
 - Many costumes are made primarily from **crepe paper**, carefully cut and layered by hand into intricate designs.
 - The largest Junkanoo parades can feature **thousands of performers** representing neighborhood groups from across the Bahamas.
 - Judging includes categories such as music, choreography, costume design, and overall presentation.
 - Junkanoo is considered the **national festival of the Bahamas** and is one of the country's most cherished cultural traditions.
