The **Kodiak bear** is one of the largest land predators on Earth and one of Alaska's most legendary wildlife species. Found only on the **Kodiak Archipelago**, these magnificent bears have evolved in relative isolation for thousands of years, growing larger than nearly every other brown bear in the world.

Despite their enormous size and powerful appearance, Kodiak bears spend much of their lives fishing for salmon, grazing on lush vegetation, digging for roots, and caring for their cubs. Watching one in its natural habitat is an unforgettable experience and often ranks as one of the greatest wildlife encounters in North America.

If your Alaska adventure includes Kodiak Island or a bear-viewing excursion, you may have the opportunity to witness one of nature's true giants.

Scientific Name: *Ursus arctos middendorffi*

Species: A subspecies of the brown bear

Height:

- Up to **10 feet (3 meters)** when standing upright

Weight:

- Adult females: **500–900 pounds**
- Adult males: **800–1,500 pounds**
- Exceptional males may exceed **1,600 pounds**

Lifespan:

- 20–30 years in the wild

Diet:

- Salmon
- Berries
- Grasses
- Roots
- Shellfish
- Carrion
- Occasionally deer or other mammals

Kodiak bears owe much of their impressive size to the abundant food available on the islands.

Where Do Kodiak Bears Live?



Kodiak bears are found **only** on the Kodiak Archipelago in southern Alaska.

Their range includes:

- Kodiak Island
- Afognak Island
- Shuyak Island
- Several smaller surrounding islands

Nearly two-thirds of their habitat is protected within the **Kodiak National Wildlife Refuge**.

Unlike other brown bears, Kodiak bears are isolated from mainland populations by water.

● Kodiak Bear vs. Brown Bear



Kodiak bears are a **subspecies of the brown bear**, but there are a few key differences.

Kodiak Bears

- Found only on the Kodiak Archipelago
- Generally larger due to abundant food and genetic isolation
- Among the largest bears in the world

Mainland Brown Bears

- Found throughout much of Alaska
- Slightly smaller on average
- Greater variation in size depending on habitat

Both deserve the same respect and should always be viewed from a safe distance.

The best opportunities include:

🐻 Kodiak National Wildlife Refuge

The premier destination for viewing Kodiak bears.

Guided excursions often visit remote areas where bears gather during salmon runs.

✈️ Fly-In Bear Viewing Tours

Many visitors take small aircraft to remote rivers and meadows where bear activity is common.

These excursions provide some of Alaska's most unforgettable wildlife experiences.

🐟 Salmon Streams

During late summer, bears congregate along rivers to feed on spawning salmon.

Watching a Kodiak bear catch fish is one of Alaska's most iconic wildlife moments.



Can Cruise Travelers See Kodiak Bears?



Yes—but usually on guided excursions rather than from the ship.

Cruises visiting **Kodiak** often offer bear-viewing tours, and some expedition itineraries spend additional time exploring wildlife-rich areas around the island.

If seeing a Kodiak bear is high on your bucket list, consider choosing a cruise that includes Kodiak or adding a land extension.

Why Salmon Matter



Salmon are essential to the Kodiak bear's survival.

Each summer, bears feed heavily during the salmon runs to build fat reserves for winter hibernation.

A large male Kodiak bear can consume dozens of salmon in a single day during peak season.

This annual feast helps them reach their incredible size.

Mothers & Cubs



Female Kodiak bears are devoted mothers.

Cubs are born during winter hibernation and remain with their mother for approximately:

2½ to 3 years

During that time, they learn:

- Fishing techniques
- Foraging
- Avoiding danger
- Navigating their environment

Watching cubs play while their mother keeps watch is one of Alaska's most memorable wildlife experiences.

Photography Tips



For the best photographs:

- Use a telephoto lens (300mm or longer if possible).
- Never approach bears for a closer shot.
- Focus on natural behaviors.
- Shoot in burst mode during action.
- Follow your guide's safety instructions at all times.

Respectful wildlife photography protects both you and the bears.



Best Time to See Kodiak Bears

May

Excellent.

Bears emerge from hibernation.

June

Excellent.

Lush vegetation provides abundant food.

July

Outstanding.

Early salmon runs begin.

August

Peak viewing.

Salmon runs are in full swing.

September

Excellent.

Bears continue feeding before returning to their dens.



Bear Safety

Kodiak bears are wild animals and deserve both respect and space.

Always:

- Stay with your guide.
- Never feed wildlife.
- Keep a safe distance.
- Remain calm if you encounter a bear.
- Follow all instructions from local guides and park personnel.

Responsible wildlife viewing helps preserve these incredible animals for future generations.

- Kodiak bears are among the **largest bears in the world**, rivaled only by the polar bear.
- Their sense of smell is so powerful they can detect food from **several miles away**.
- They can run at speeds of **up to 35 mph**, despite weighing well over half a ton.

- Kodiak bears are excellent swimmers and frequently cross rivers and coastal waters.
 - The Kodiak Archipelago's protected habitat has helped maintain one of the healthiest bear populations in North America.

Joe's Logbook

Standing anywhere near a Kodiak bear—at a safe distance, of course—changes your perspective on wildlife. Pictures don't do them justice. Until you see one in person, it's hard to grasp just how massive these animals really are.

One thing I always remind travelers is that the size isn't what impresses me most. It's how calm they often appear. You might watch a bear patiently waiting for the perfect moment to catch a salmon or see a mother gently keeping an eye on her cubs. Those moments show a side of these incredible animals that many people never expect.
