World-Class Fishing



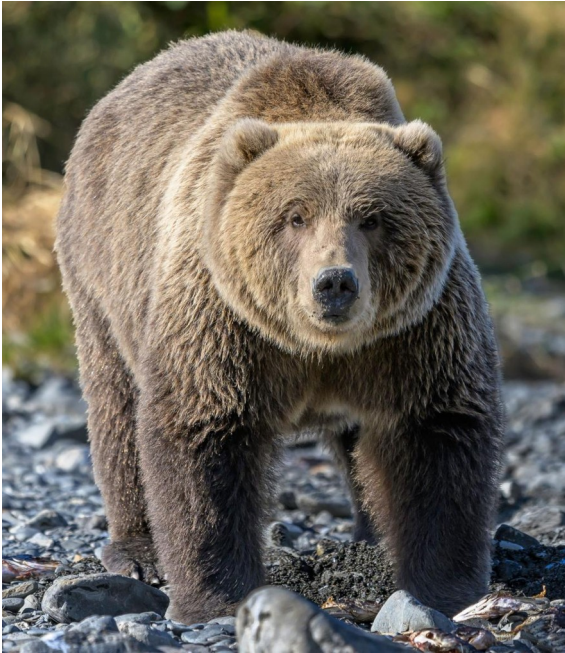
Kodiak is renowned among anglers worldwide.
