Green Vervet Monkeys



The **Green Vervet Monkey** is the species most commonly seen in the Eastern Caribbean.

Originally introduced centuries ago from West Africa, they have become a familiar sight on islands such as:

- BB Barbados
- KN St. Kitts

Recognizable by:

- Gray-green fur
- Black face
- White facial fringe
- Long tail
- Curious personality

They often live in family groups called **troops**.

Capuchin Monkeys



Visitors to **Roatán** may also encounter **White-faced Capuchin Monkeys** at wildlife parks and rescue centers.

Capuchins are famous for:

- Incredible intelligence
- Problem-solving abilities
- Curious behavior
- Excellent climbing skills
- Strong social bonds

These encounters are typically part of educational conservation programs.

BB Barbados

Green Vervet Monkeys are frequently seen in gardens, forests, and nature reserves.

KN St. Kitts

Monkeys are common throughout much of the island, particularly in wooded areas and scenic overlooks.

HN Roatán

Wildlife sanctuaries provide educational opportunities to learn about rescued capuchin monkeys and other native animals.

Life in the Trees



Monkeys spend much of their lives in the forest canopy.

They are excellent climbers thanks to:

- Strong arms and legs
- Excellent balance
- Agile movements
- Sharp eyesight

Watching a troop move through the trees is both impressive and entertaining.

What Do They Eat?



Most Caribbean monkeys enjoy a varied diet.

Foods include:

- Fruits
- Leaves
- Seeds
- Flowers
- Insects
- Occasionally small animals

In the wild, they spend much of the day searching for food.

Respect Wildlife



For a safe and enjoyable encounter:

- Never feed wild monkeys.
- Secure loose food and drinks.
- Keep a respectful distance.
- Avoid sudden movements.
- Follow your guide's instructions.

Feeding wildlife can alter natural behavior and create health problems for the animals.



Photography Tips



For great wildlife photos:

- Use a zoom lens.
- Be patient.
- Focus on natural behavior.
- Include tropical surroundings.
- Avoid using flash.

- Green Vervet Monkeys were introduced to some Caribbean islands several centuries ago and have adapted well to island life.
 - Vervet monkeys communicate using a wide range of vocal calls, including specific alarm calls for different predators.
 - Capuchin monkeys are among the **most intelligent primates** in the Americas and are known to use simple tools in the wild.
 - A troop of monkeys may include **20 or more individuals**, with family members working together to protect and care for one another.
 - Monkeys spend much of their day grooming each other, strengthening social bonds and helping keep their fur clean.
