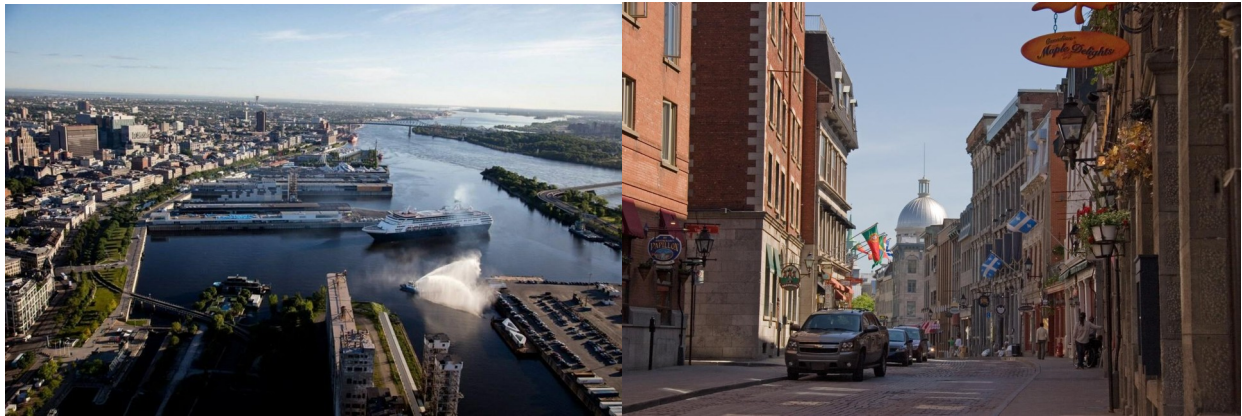


Montréal Cruise Port Guide

The heart of the city is **Old Montréal**.

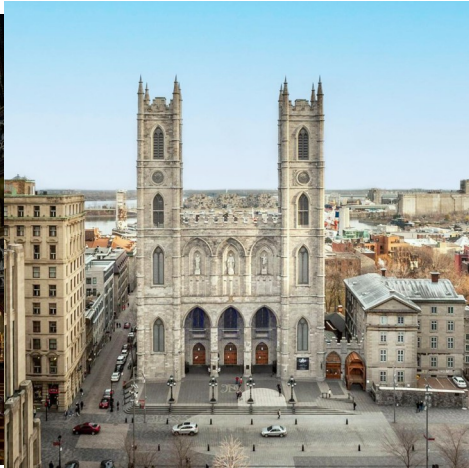
Visitors enjoy:

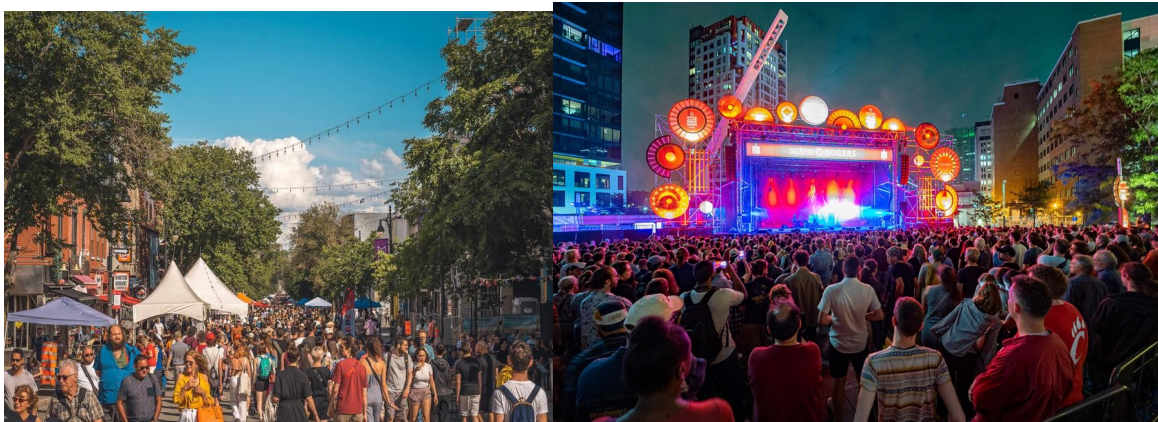
