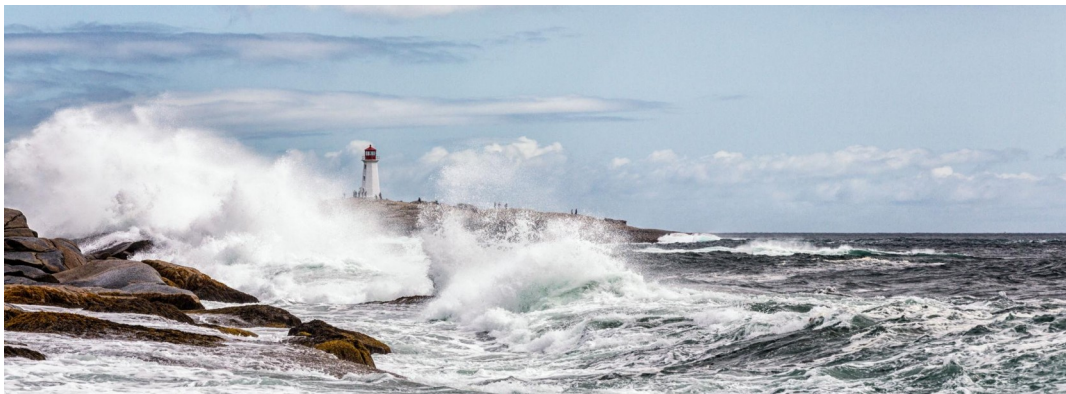

Photography Tips



For memorable photos:

- Capture early morning light when arriving in port.
 - Photograph colorful waterfronts and historic buildings.
 - Bring a zoom lens or use your phone's telephoto mode for wildlife.
 - Include people in scenic shots to show scale.
 - Keep your camera handy—beautiful views often appear as the ship sails into or out of port.
