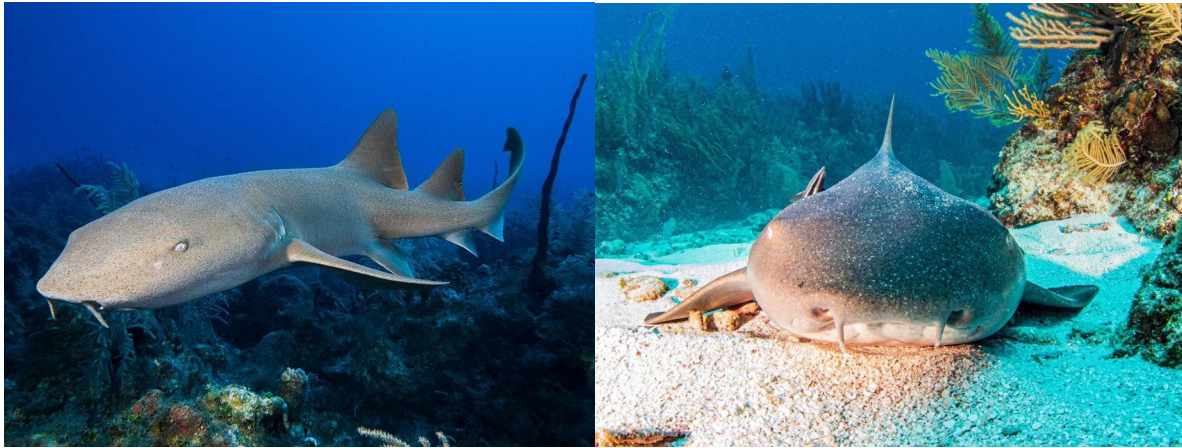




Caribbean Nurse Shark Guide

Meet One of the Caribbean's Most Gentle Ocean Predators



Despite their intimidating appearance, **Nurse Sharks** are among the most gentle and fascinating sharks found throughout the Caribbean. Commonly seen resting beneath coral ledges, cruising over sandy bottoms, or swimming calmly around reefs, these slow-moving sharks are a favorite sight for snorkelers and scuba divers alike.

Unlike the fast-swimming sharks often portrayed in movies, nurse sharks are peaceful bottom-dwellers that spend much of the day resting. Encountering one in the wild is an unforgettable reminder that sharks play a vital role in maintaining healthy ocean ecosystems.

For cruise travelers visiting destinations such as **Belize, Cozumel, Bonaire, Roatán, Grand Cayman,** or **The Bahamas**, seeing a nurse shark is one of the Caribbean's most exciting wildlife experiences.



Meet the Nurse Shark



The Nurse Shark (*Ginglymostoma cirratum*) is a slow-moving species commonly found throughout the tropical Atlantic and Caribbean.

They are recognized by:

- Broad, rounded head
- Small eyes
- Long whisker-like barbels near the mouth
- Powerful tail
- Brown to gray coloration

Adult nurse sharks typically grow between **7 and 10 feet (2–3 meters)** in length.



Where Can You Find Nurse Sharks?



Nurse sharks inhabit warm, shallow waters throughout the Caribbean.

Popular locations include:

- BZ Belize Barrier Reef
- MX Cozumel
- BQ Bonaire
- HN Roatán
- KY Grand Cayman
- BS The Bahamas

They are most often found around:

- Coral reefs
 - Seagrass beds
 - Sandy bottoms
 - Mangrove habitats
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What Do Nurse Sharks Eat?



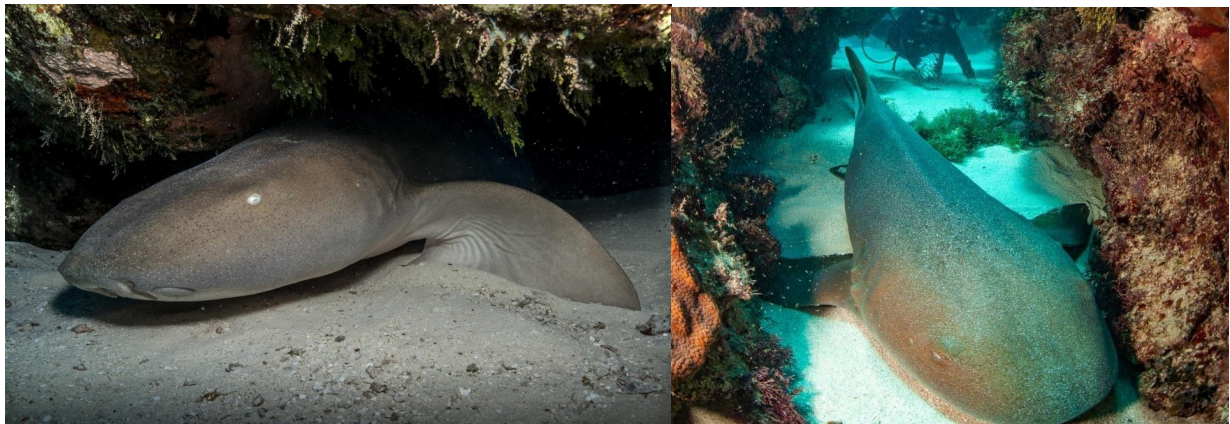
Unlike fast, open-water sharks, nurse sharks feed along the seafloor.

Their diet includes:

- Lobsters
- Crabs
- Shrimp
- Octopus
- Squid
- Small fish
- Sea urchins

They use powerful suction to pull prey from crevices in the reef.

A Surprisingly Relaxed Shark



One of the most unusual characteristics of nurse sharks is their calm behavior.

During the day they often:

- Rest beneath coral ledges
- Lie motionless on the seafloor
- Gather in small groups
- Swim slowly through reef systems

They become more active after sunset when they begin searching for food.

Snorkeling & Diving with Nurse Sharks



Seeing a nurse shark underwater is a thrilling experience.

If you encounter one:

- Stay calm.
- Maintain a respectful distance.
- Never touch or chase the shark.
- Let it continue its natural behavior.
- Listen to your guide's instructions.

Most nurse sharks simply ignore divers and snorkelers as they continue resting or swimming.

- Balance fish populations
- Remove weak or sick animals
- Support healthy coral reefs
- Maintain biodiversity

- Nurse sharks can remain motionless on the seafloor because they are able to **pump water over their gills**, allowing them to breathe without constantly swimming.
 - Their small whisker-like **barbels** help them locate prey hidden beneath the sand or inside reef crevices.
 - Although they have thousands of small teeth, nurse sharks primarily feed on slow-moving bottom-dwelling animals.
 - Nurse sharks are generally **nocturnal**, becoming much more active after dark.
 - They have existed for **millions of years** and are an important part of Caribbean reef ecosystems.
