Your Complete Guide to Alaska's Most Important Fish

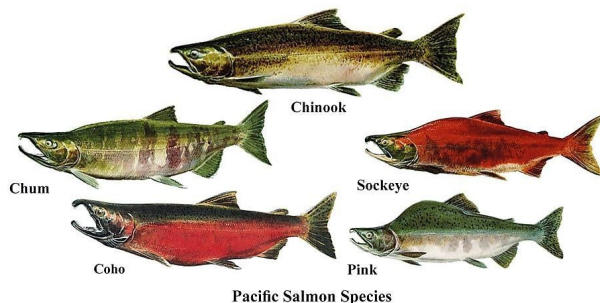


No animal is more important to Alaska's ecosystems than the **Pacific salmon**. Every summer, millions of salmon return from the ocean to the very rivers and streams where they were born, completing one of the greatest migrations in the natural world.

This incredible journey fuels much of Alaska's wildlife. Bears gather along rivers to catch salmon, bald eagles feast on spawning fish, seals and sea lions hunt near river mouths, and orcas and humpback whales depend on salmon as an important food source. Even the forests benefit, as nutrients carried upstream by salmon help nourish trees and plants.

Whether you're watching salmon leap over waterfalls, seeing a bear catch one in mid-air, or enjoying fresh Alaska salmon for dinner, you'll quickly realize that salmon are truly the heartbeat of Alaska.

After spending years in the ocean, Pacific salmon return to the exact streams where they hatched.

Along the way they:

- Swim hundreds of miles upstream.
- Leap waterfalls.
- Avoid bears, eagles, and other predators.
- Spawn before completing their life cycle.

This remarkable migration is one of nature's greatest survival stories.

Salmon support an incredible variety of Alaska wildlife, including:

Photography Tips



For the best photos:

- Use burst mode.
- Focus on waterfalls or shallow rapids.
- Be patient—salmon may leap several times.

- Include wildlife interactions when possible.
 - Visit during late July through early September for peak spawning activity.
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Best Time to See Salmon Runs

May

Some early King salmon arrive.

June

Good.

Several species begin entering rivers.

July

Outstanding.

Large runs begin throughout Alaska.

August

Peak season.

Many rivers are filled with spawning salmon.

September

Excellent.

Late runs continue in many locations.



Interesting Behaviors

Pacific salmon are known for:

- Returning to their birth streams using an extraordinary sense of smell.
- Leaping waterfalls and rapids.
- Changing color dramatically during spawning.
- Feeding countless wildlife species.
- Completing one of the world's greatest migrations.

Scientists believe salmon can detect tiny chemical differences in the water to help them find their way home.

If I had to pick one animal that best represents Alaska, it might actually be the salmon.
