Explore the Old Port District



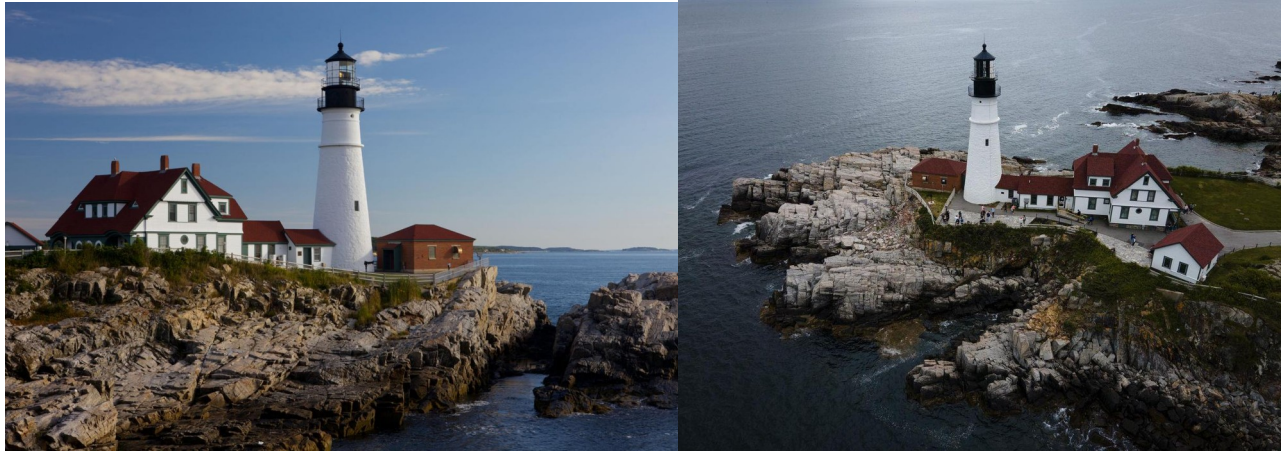
The heart of Portland is its historic **Old Port District**.

 - Leave room in your suitcase for local food products and artisan gifts.
 - Plan extra time at Portland Head Light if photography is a priority.

- Portland Head Light was first illuminated in **1791** and was commissioned by President George Washington.
- Portland has more **restaurants per capita** than almost any city in the United States, earning it a reputation as a food lover's destination.
- Casco Bay is home to **more than 200 islands**, many of which are accessible by ferry.
- The Old Port's brick buildings once served as warehouses for one of New England's busiest shipping ports.

- Maine's lobster industry lands **over 100 million pounds of lobster** in many years, making it one of the state's most iconic industries.
