Cruise Port Information



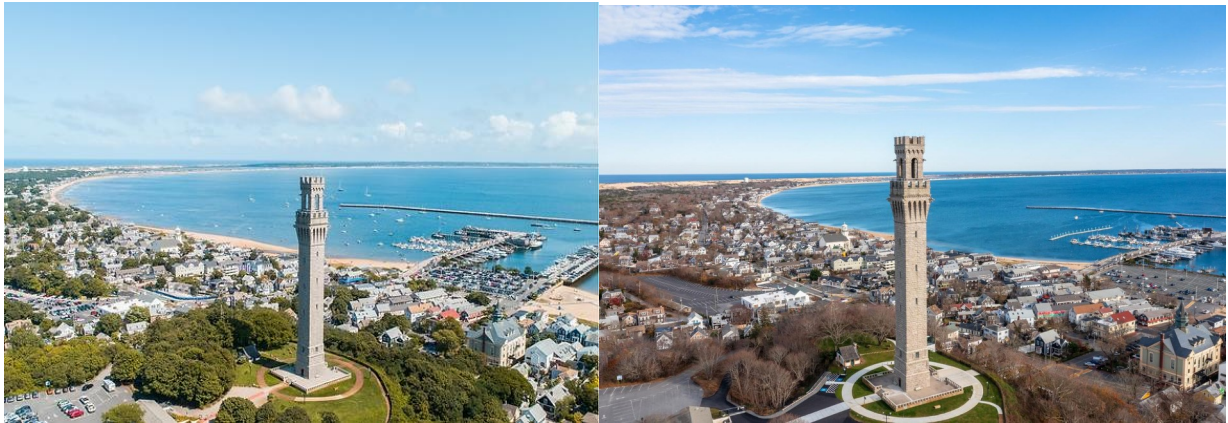
Most cruise ships visiting Provincetown anchor offshore.

This means:

- Guests typically travel ashore by tender.
- The landing area is within walking distance of downtown.
- Most attractions are easy to reach on foot.
- Return early enough to avoid long tender lines.

Provincetown is one of the easiest New England ports to explore independently.

Pilgrim Monument & Provincetown Museum



The city's most recognizable landmark is the **Pilgrim Monument**.

Completed in 1910, it commemorates the arrival of the Pilgrims in Provincetown Harbor in **1620**, before they eventually settled in Plymouth.

Visitors can:

- Climb nearly 250 feet to the observation deck.
- Enjoy spectacular views of Cape Cod.
- Learn about the area's rich maritime history.

The panoramic views are well worth the climb.



Stroll Commercial Street



Commercial Street is the heart of Provincetown.

Here you'll find:

- Art galleries
- Boutique shops
- Seafood restaurants
- Cafés
- Ice cream shops
- Historic buildings
- Street performers

It's one of the liveliest waterfront streets in New England.



Whale Watching



Provincetown is considered one of the **best whale-watching destinations in North America**.

Depending on the season, you may see:

- Humpback Whales
- Fin Whales
- Minke Whales
- North Atlantic Right Whales (rare)
- Dolphins
- Harbor Porpoises

Many tours depart directly from the harbor.



Cape Cod National Seashore



Nature lovers should explore the nearby **Cape Cod National Seashore**.

Popular spots include:

- Race Point Beach
- Herring Cove Beach
- Province Lands
- Sand dunes
- Scenic bike trails

The dramatic dunes and Atlantic coastline are unlike anywhere else in New England.

- Provincetown Harbor is where the **Mayflower first anchored in 1620** before the Pilgrims sailed to Plymouth.
 - The **Pilgrim Monument** is the tallest all-granite structure in the United States, standing **252 feet** tall.
 - Provincetown is located at the northern tip of **Cape Cod**, where Cape Cod Bay meets the Atlantic Ocean.
 - The surrounding waters are among the **best whale-watching locations in the world** during the summer and early fall.
 - Much of the surrounding landscape is protected as part of the **Cape Cod National Seashore**.
