Where Can You See Red Foxes?



Red foxes can be found across much of Alaska.

Some of the best places to spot them include:

- Denali National Park
- Kenai Peninsula
- Anchorage area
- Fairbanks
- Interior Alaska
- Arctic tundra

- Open meadows and forest edges

Unlike bears or moose, foxes are often seen alone.

Red foxes rely on excellent hearing to locate prey beneath snow or tall grass.

One of their most famous hunting techniques is called the "**mousing pounce.**"

After listening carefully, they leap high into the air and dive nose-first into the snow to catch hidden rodents.

It's one of the most entertaining wildlife behaviors to witness.



Can You See Red Foxes on an Alaska Cruise?

Red fox sightings during a cruise are **possible but uncommon**.

You're more likely to encounter one during:

Photography Tips



If you're fortunate enough to spot a fox:

- Keep your camera ready—they rarely stay still for long.
- Use a zoom lens.
- Photograph at eye level whenever possible.
- Focus on the eyes.
- Include the surrounding landscape to tell the story.

Foxes actively hunt and prepare for winter.



Interesting Behaviors

Red foxes are known for:

- Traveling alone
- Excellent hearing
- Remarkable jumping ability
- Hiding extra food for later
- Curious personalities

Their thick bushy tail helps with balance and provides warmth during cold Alaska winters.

Fox sightings are often completely unexpected. Keep your camera within reach whenever you're traveling through Alaska by rail, motorcoach, or on foot. A red fox may appear alongside the road, cross an open meadow, or pause long enough for a perfect photo before quietly slipping back into the wilderness.

- Red foxes can hear small rodents moving beneath nearly **2 feet of snow**.
 - They can leap **more than 6 feet** into the air while hunting.
 - Their bushy tail, often called a "**brush**," helps keep them warm while sleeping.
 - Red foxes are among the most widely distributed wild mammals in the world.
 - They communicate using a surprising variety of barks, yips, screams, and body language.

Joe's Logbook

One of the things I love about red foxes is that they always seem to have somewhere important to be. Unlike a moose standing quietly beside the road, a fox is usually on the move—trotting across a meadow, hunting for a meal, or disappearing into the brush just as quickly as it appeared.

If you're lucky enough to see one, take a moment to simply watch. They're incredibly graceful and surprisingly entertaining, especially if you catch one using its famous "mousing pounce." It's amazing how such a small predator can survive—and thrive—in Alaska's rugged wilderness.

My advice is simple: keep your camera close and your eyes open. A fox may only give you a few seconds, but those few seconds can become one of your favorite wildlife memories from Alaska.
