

Alaska Salmon Run Guide

Witness One of Nature's Greatest Migrations



Every summer, one of the world's most incredible wildlife events unfolds across Alaska. Millions of **Pacific salmon** leave the ocean and return to the rivers and streams where they were born, battling strong currents, leaping waterfalls, and traveling hundreds of miles to complete their life cycle.

Known as the **Salmon Run**, this annual migration is far more than an impressive journey—it's the foundation of Alaska's entire ecosystem. Bears gather along rivers to feast, bald eagles fill the trees overhead, seals and sea lions patrol river mouths, and countless other animals take advantage of this remarkable natural event.

For many visitors, witnessing a salmon run is just as memorable as seeing a glacier or spotting a whale, making it one of Alaska's most unforgettable experiences.

What is the Salmon Run?



Pacific salmon spend most of their lives in the ocean before returning to the exact freshwater streams where they hatched.

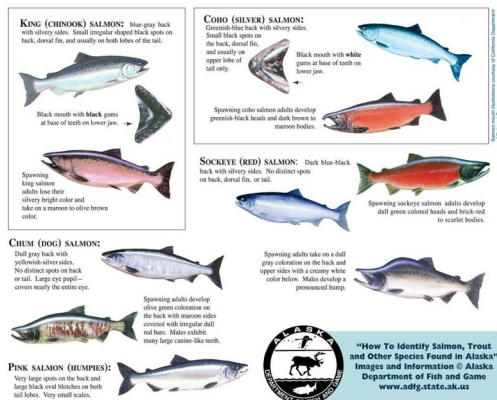
Along the journey, they:

- Swim hundreds of miles upstream.
- Leap over waterfalls and rapids.
- Navigate powerful currents.
- Avoid predators.
- Spawn before completing their life cycle.

This remarkable migration has taken place for thousands of years.

Meet Alaska's Five Salmon Species

How To Identify The Five Salmon Species Found In Alaska



Alaska is home to five species of Pacific salmon:

- 👑 **King (Chinook)** – Largest species
- ♥ **Sockeye (Red)** – Brilliant spawning colors
- 💖 **Pink (Humpy)** – Most abundant
- 🐟 **Coho (Silver)** – Popular with anglers
- 🐕 **Chum (Dog)** – Distinctive spawning markings

Each species returns at slightly different times throughout the summer.



Why the Salmon Run Matters



The salmon run feeds an incredible variety of Alaska wildlife.

Animals that depend on salmon include:

- Brown Bears
- Black Bears
- Bald Eagles
- Harbor Seals
- Steller Sea Lions
- River Otters
- Orcas
- Wolves
- Gulls
- Ravens

Even Alaska's forests benefit as nutrients from salmon are carried inland by wildlife and naturally returned to the soil.



Best Places to Experience the Salmon Run



Some of Alaska's best viewing locations include:

Brooks Falls (Katmai National Park)

World-famous for bears catching salmon.

Ketchikan

Salmon streams and Creek Street offer excellent viewing, especially later in the season.

Valdez

The Solomon Gulch Hatchery attracts salmon, sea lions, seals, gulls, and eagles.

Sitka

Several local streams offer excellent salmon viewing.

Kenai Peninsula

Home to some of Alaska's largest salmon runs.



Best Time to See the Salmon Run



May

Early King Salmon begin arriving.

June

More rivers become active.

July

Excellent.

Large salmon runs begin.

August

★★★★★ Peak Season

Millions of salmon fill Alaska's rivers.

September

Excellent.

Late-season spawning continues in many waterways.

Many Alaska cruises visit ports during peak salmon season.

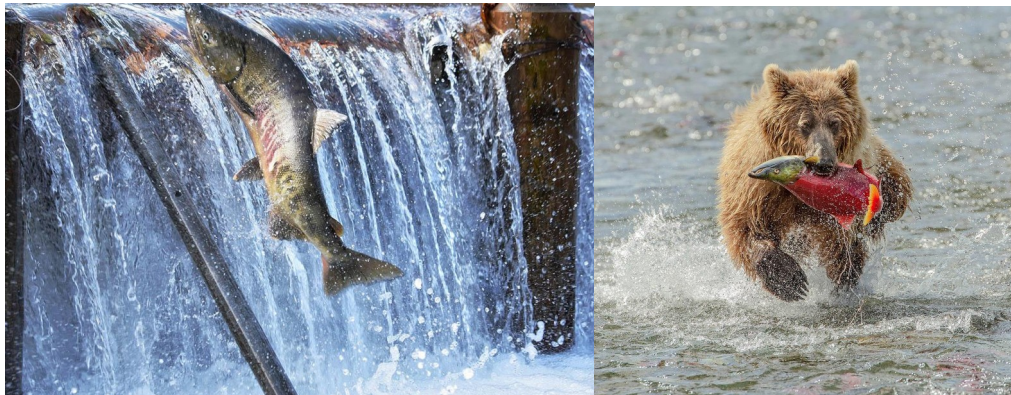
Popular shore excursions include:

Photography Tips



For unforgettable photos:

- Use burst mode to capture jumping salmon.
- Focus on waterfalls and rapids.
- Photograph wildlife interactions.
- Visit during the early morning or late afternoon for softer light.
- Include people or surrounding scenery to show the scale of the event.

Patience often rewards photographers with spectacular action shots.

Fun Things to Watch For

As salmon return, watch for:

-  Bears waiting along riverbanks
-  Eagles perched in nearby trees
-  River otters hunting
-  Harbor seals near river mouths
-  Salmon leaping waterfalls

It's one of the few places in the world where so many wildlife species gather around a single natural event.

- Millions of Pacific salmon return to Alaska each summer using an incredible sense of smell to locate the exact streams where they were born.
 - Some salmon travel **hundreds of miles inland** and leap waterfalls more than **10 feet high**.
 - After spawning, the nutrients from salmon help nourish forests, insects, birds, and mammals throughout Alaska.
 - Bears often eat only the fattiest parts of salmon during peak runs, leaving the rest to feed eagles, foxes, and other scavengers.
 - The annual salmon run supports one of the richest wildlife ecosystems on the planet.
