Meet the Caribbean's Sea Turtles



Several species of sea turtles call the Caribbean home.

● **Green Sea Turtle**

The most commonly seen species while snorkeling.

Known for:

- Smooth shell
- Gentle nature
- Feeding on seagrass
- Calm swimming behavior

● **Hawksbill Turtle**

Easily recognized by its pointed beak.

Known for:

- Beautiful patterned shell
- Living around coral reefs
- Feeding primarily on sponges
- Excellent agility among reef formations

● **Loggerhead Turtle**

One of the largest hard-shelled sea turtles.

Known for:

- Powerful jaws
- Large head
- Strong swimming ability

● **Leatherback Turtle**

The world's largest sea turtle.

Known for:

- Leather-like shell
 - Long-distance migrations
 - Feeding mainly on jellyfish

What Do Sea Turtles Eat?



Different species have different diets.

Examples include:

- Seagrass
- Marine algae
- Sponges
- Jellyfish
- Small invertebrates

Their feeding habits help keep coral reefs and seagrass ecosystems healthy.

Nesting Season



Every year, female sea turtles return to sandy beaches to lay their eggs.

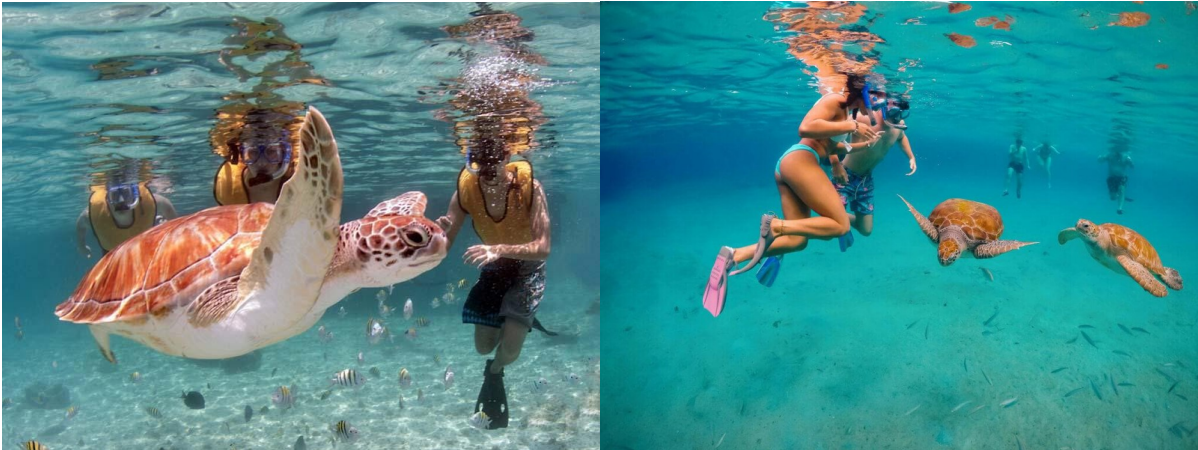
During nesting season they:

- Crawl ashore at night.
- Dig nests in the sand.
- Lay dozens of eggs.
- Cover the nest before returning to the sea.

Weeks later, tiny hatchlings emerge and instinctively race toward the ocean.

Watching a hatchling release is a truly unforgettable experience when offered through authorized conservation programs.

Snorkeling with Sea Turtles



If you're fortunate enough to encounter a turtle while snorkeling:

- Stay calm.
- Keep a respectful distance.
- Never chase or touch the turtle.
- Allow it to surface naturally for air.
- Let the turtle decide how close it wants to come.

Watching a sea turtle glide effortlessly through the water is one of the Caribbean's most magical wildlife experiences.

Protecting Sea Turtles



All Caribbean sea turtle species are protected.

Major conservation efforts focus on:

- Protecting nesting beaches
- Reducing plastic pollution
- Conserving coral reefs
- Preventing illegal harvesting

- Educating visitors about responsible wildlife viewing

Fun Facts

- Sea turtles have been swimming in Earth's oceans for **more than 100 million years**, surviving since the age of the dinosaurs.
 - Female turtles often return to the **same beach where they hatched** to lay their own eggs.
 - **Leatherback turtles** can grow to more than **6 feet (1.8 meters)** long and weigh over **1,000 pounds (450 kilograms)**.
 - Sea turtles must surface regularly to breathe air, even though they spend most of their lives in the ocean.
 - Scientists believe sea turtles use Earth's magnetic field as one of the ways they navigate across thousands of miles of open ocean.

Joe's Logbook

If you ask experienced snorkelers about their favorite Caribbean wildlife encounter, there's a good chance they'll mention sea turtles.

There's something almost calming about watching one swim. They never seem to be in a hurry. They simply glide through the water with a grace that makes it look effortless.

One thing I've learned is that the best encounters happen when you stop trying to chase the experience. Float quietly, keep your distance, and let the turtle decide where it wants to go. More often than not, you'll end up with a much more memorable moment than if you had tried to get closer.

Every time I see a sea turtle, I'm reminded that these incredible animals have been crossing the Caribbean for millions of years. We may only share a few minutes with them during a cruise, but those few minutes often become some of the most treasured memories of the entire trip.

If you're lucky enough to spot one, consider yourself part of a very old story—one that began long before cruise ships ever sailed these beautiful waters.
