Your Complete Guide to Alaska's Most Historic Coastal Community

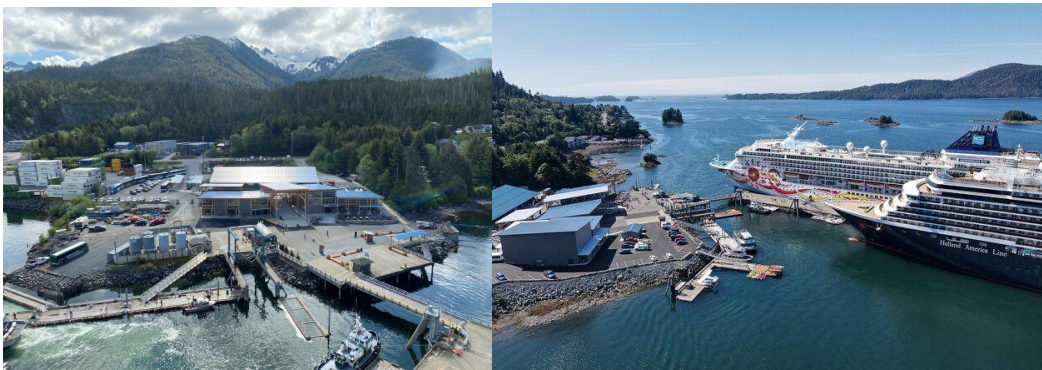

Located on **Baranof Island**, Sitka is surrounded by the Pacific Ocean, towering mountains, lush temperate rainforest, and abundant wildlife. It's also one of the best places in Alaska to spot sea otters, whales, bald eagles, and even brown bears.

Because of its unique history and breathtaking scenery, many seasoned Alaska cruisers consider Sitka one of the most interesting ports in the state.

Where Do Cruise Ships Dock?



Most large cruise ships dock at the **Sitka Sound Cruise Terminal**, located approximately **6 miles from downtown Sitka**.

Complimentary or paid shuttle buses transport passengers between the cruise terminal and downtown throughout the day.

- Waterfront parks

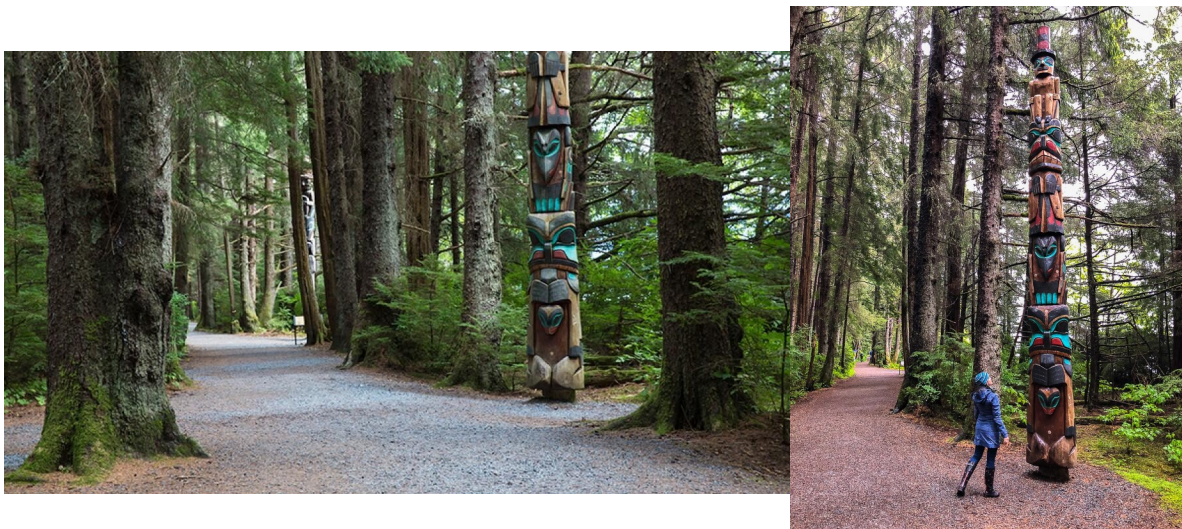
The town has a relaxed atmosphere that invites visitors to slow down and enjoy the surroundings.



Top Things to Do



Sitka National Historical Park



Alaska's oldest national park is one of Sitka's must-see attractions.

Visitors can enjoy:

- Beautiful totem pole trail
- Coastal walking paths
- Native cultural exhibits
- Visitor Center
- Russian and Tlingit history

The easy walking trails make this an excellent activity for all ages.

St. Michael's Cathedral



Originally built in the 1800s, this Russian Orthodox cathedral remains one of Sitka's most recognizable landmarks.

It's a reminder of Sitka's fascinating past as the capital of Russian America.

Alaska Raptor Center



One of Sitka's most popular attractions.

You'll often see injured eagles being cared for before they're released back into the wild.

Fortress of the Bear



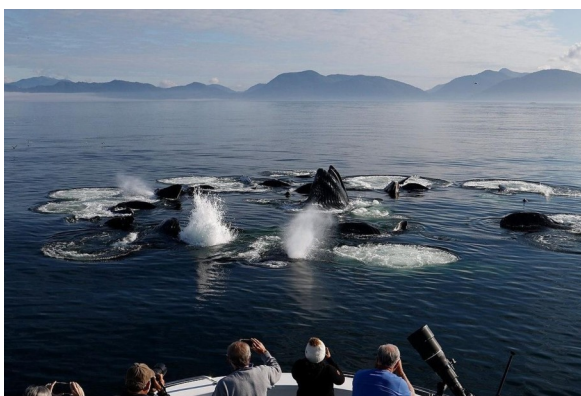
A rescue facility providing a home for orphaned brown and black bears that cannot survive in the wild.

Whale Watching & Wildlife Cruises



Sitka offers outstanding marine wildlife viewing.

Common sightings include:

- Humpback whales

- Puffins

Sea otters are especially common around Sitka and are one of the area's signature wildlife attractions.

Summer temperatures generally range from:

50–65°F (10–18°C)

Expect:

- Cool mornings
- Mild afternoons

Dress in layers and carry a waterproof jacket.
