## Meet Soufrière Hills Volcano



Soufrière Hills is an active stratovolcano located in the southern part of Montserrat.

Before 1995, it had remained quiet for hundreds of years.

Today, the volcano continues to be carefully monitored while visitors can safely experience designated viewing areas and learn about its remarkable history.

The eruption dramatically reshaped:

- Mountains
- Valleys
- Rivers
- Coastline
- Communities



## Plymouth – The Pompeii of the Caribbean



Perhaps the most striking sight on Montserrat is the abandoned capital city of **Plymouth**.

The city was buried beneath volcanic ash, mudflows, and debris during the eruptions.

Today it remains:

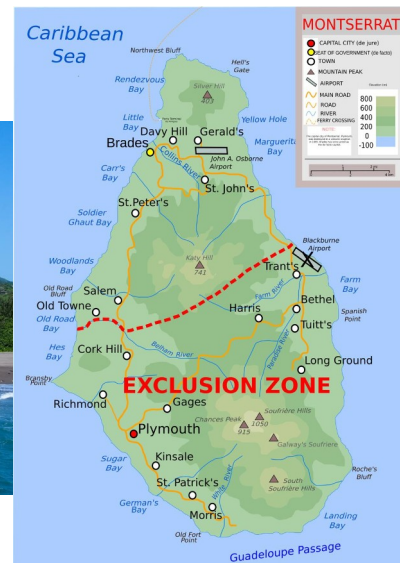
- Abandoned
- Partially buried
- Preserved as a reminder of the volcano's power

Because of its remarkable story, Plymouth is often called the "**Pompeii of the Caribbean.**"

Visitors can view the city from designated observation areas outside the exclusion zone.

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# The Exclusion Zone



The southern portion of Montserrat remains a restricted area known as the **Exclusion Zone**.

Access is carefully controlled to protect visitors while allowing scientists to continue monitoring volcanic activity.

Many guided tours provide safe viewpoints overlooking:

- Plymouth
- Lava deposits
- Ash-covered valleys
- The volcanic dome



## Montserrat Volcano Observatory



One of the best places to understand the island's story is the **Montserrat Volcano Observatory**.

Visitors can learn about:

- How volcanoes work
- The 1995 eruption
- Ongoing monitoring
- Seismic activity
- Scientific research
- The island's recovery

Interactive exhibits make complex geology easy to understand.
