Standing more than **60 feet tall**, this giant violin celebrates Cape Breton's rich musical heritage.

It's one of the first things cruise passengers see after leaving the ship and has become a favorite photo stop.



The Cabot Trail



The most popular excursion from Sydney is the spectacular **Cabot Trail**.

Frequently ranked among the world's greatest scenic drives, it features:

This remarkable reconstruction brings an 18th-century French fortress back to life with:

- The **Cabot Trail** stretches approximately **185 miles (298 km)** around northern Cape Breton Island and is consistently ranked among the world's most scenic drives.
 - Sydney's **Big Fiddle** stands over **60 feet (18 meters)** tall and celebrates Cape Breton's rich Celtic music traditions.
 - Cape Breton is one of the few places in North America where **Scottish Gaelic** is still preserved through music, culture, and community traditions.
 - The **Fortress of Louisbourg** is the largest reconstructed 18th-century French fortified town in North America.
 - Cape Breton Highlands National Park is home to one of the highest concentrations of **moose in Nova Scotia**.
