Queen Angelfish

Recognized by:

- Brilliant blue body
- Bright yellow tail

- Electric blue highlights
- Blue "crown" above the eyes

The Queen Angelfish is often considered the unofficial symbol of Caribbean coral reefs.

● Blue Tang



Made famous by the movie *Finding Dory*, the Blue Tang is common throughout the Caribbean.

Known for:

- Brilliant blue body
- Yellow tail
- Fast swimming
- Algae-eating habits

By feeding on algae, Blue Tangs help keep coral reefs healthy.



Parrotfish



Parrotfish are among the reef's most important residents.

They use their powerful beaks to scrape algae from coral and rock surfaces.

Their work:

- Prevents algae from overwhelming coral
- Helps maintain healthy reefs
- Produces much of the Caribbean's white sand through digested coral fragments

A single large parrotfish can create **hundreds of pounds of sand each year**.

Butterflyfish & Angelfish



These elegant fish add incredible color to Caribbean reefs.

Common species include:

- Banded Butterflyfish
- Four-eye Butterflyfish
- French Angelfish
- Gray Angelfish

Their bright colors help make every snorkeling trip memorable.

● Sergeant Major



One of the easiest fish for beginners to identify.

Look for:

- Yellow body
- Five bold black vertical stripes
- Large schools near reefs and docks

These curious fish often swim surprisingly close to snorkelers.
