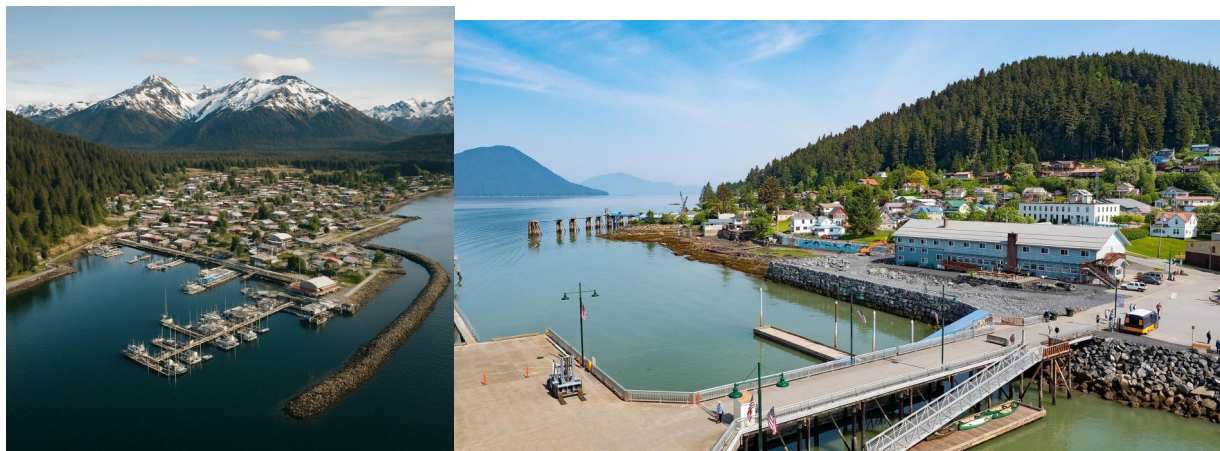


🦅 Wrangell, Alaska Cruise Port Guide

Downtown Wrangell offers a relaxed pace and authentic Alaska atmosphere.

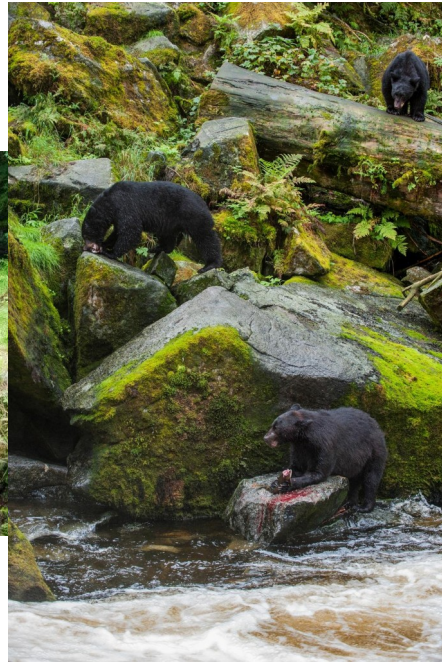
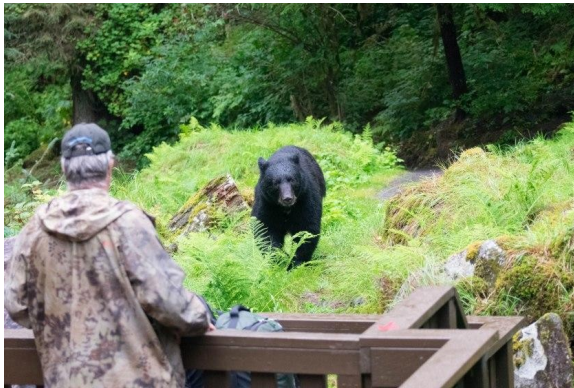
You'll find:

🐻 Anan Wildlife Observatory



One of Alaska's most extraordinary wildlife experiences.

Each summer, both **black bears** and **coastal brown bears** gather along Anan Creek to feed on spawning salmon.

Visitors may also see:

- Bald eagles
- Harbor seals
- Salmon
- River otters

Access is by guided excursion and permits are limited, making advance reservations essential.

Chief Shakes Tribal House



Learn about the rich heritage of the Tlingit people by visiting this reconstructed traditional clan house.

Highlights include:

- Totem poles
- Native carvings
- Cultural exhibits
- Beautiful harbor views

It's one of Wrangell's most important cultural landmarks.

Wrangell Museum



A wonderful introduction to the town's fascinating history.

Exhibits cover:

- Native cultures
- Russian settlement
- Gold Rush
- Commercial fishing
- Local wildlife

Perfect for visitors interested in Alaska's past.

LeConte Glacier Excursions



Wrangell serves as the gateway to **LeConte Glacier**, the southernmost tidewater glacier in North America.

Boat excursions offer opportunities to:

- Cruise among floating icebergs
- View the glacier up close
- Spot seals and seabirds
- Photograph spectacular scenery

This is one of Wrangell's signature excursions.

Jet Boat & River Tours

Wrangell is an outstanding destination for wildlife enthusiasts.

Common sightings include:

- Black bears
- Bald eagles
- Harbor seals
- Sea lions
- Humpback whales
- River otters
- Salmon

Bring binoculars—you'll likely use them throughout the day.

Summer temperatures generally range from:

50–65°F (10–18°C)

Expect:

- Cool mornings
- Comfortable afternoons

Joe's Logbook

Wrangell is one of those ports that often flies under the radar, but that's part of what makes it so special. It hasn't been transformed into a major tourist destination, and you can still feel like you're visiting a real Alaska community rather than just another cruise stop.

If you're lucky enough to visit Anan Wildlife Observatory, prepare for an experience unlike anything else in Alaska. Seeing black bears and coastal brown bears fishing side by side during the salmon run is something you'll be talking about long after your cruise ends.

Even if you stay in town, take your time. Walk the waterfront, chat with the locals, and soak in the history. Wrangell has a quiet charm that's easy to overlook if you're rushing from one attraction to the next. Sometimes the most memorable Alaska experiences come in places where life still moves at its own pace.
